'Autzen seemed to be the big issue," Ramey said. "There were two kinds of safety concerns: the safety of the car, and the safety of the person going from their car to campus," he said. "Both of these are very legitimate concerns." Students were also concerned about the inconvenience of parking at Autzen, Ramey said.

Although students were pri-

marily concerned with the Autzen parking proposal. members of the Campus Planning Committee said students misunderstood the proposal.

"Autzen is one of many suggestions," said Joshua Akin, a physics senior and member of the planning committee. "Students have pointed to that suggestion more than the planning committee has."

Other proposals include promoting carpooling, publi-cizing bike routes and offering an emergency ride to people who rely on buses or other inflexible transportation.
