Kylee Justin Brooks, former fraternity leader, was read charges of first-degree sodomy during an arraignment Monday afternoon in the courthouse at the Lane County Jail. Brooks will enter a plea after an expected indictment by the grand jury.

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Demolition clears way for Willamette Street Construction

Eugene's mayor jackhammered her contribution into the changing face of the downtown area

Mayor Ruth Bascom put on a hard hat Monday morning during a news conference and fulfilled her 1992 campaign promise to jackhammer the fountain in the center of Eugene's pedestrian mall on Broadway and Willamette streets.

This event officially marked the beginning of the construction project to reopen Willamette Street to motorized traffic.

Before Bascom got onto the large piece of machinery, she thanked many people who were part of the project. She said the bronze plaque on the fountain will be placed in the new plaza as a piece of Eugene's history.
