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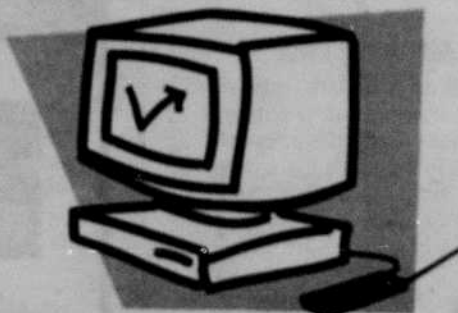

Arraignment: Police catch suspect minutes after call

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The multiple witnesses who assisted the police in the description of the suspect helped an officer spot the suspect a short distance from the scene of the incident, said Jan Power, public information officer.

"The witnesses are directly responsible for apprehending the suspect so quickly," Power said.

The victim is a 19-year-old University student. It is the policy of the Eugene Department of Public Safety and the *Oregon Daily Emerald* to withhold the names of sexual assault victims.

Brooks was registered winter term 1996 as a sociology undergraduate and is also the former president of Sigma Alpha Epsilon. He has been a student at the University for four years.

According to police reports, the victim was approached from behind by the suspect and dragged into the cemetery where she was sexually assaulted.

A resident close to the scene heard a woman screaming and called 911 at 1:42 a.m., Gilliam said.

Multiple police units responded to the area and a German Shepherd police dog found the suspect hiding in bushes near a gravestone at 1:50 a.m.

Brooks was then taken into custody and lodged at the Lane County Jail, where he remains.

The victim was taken to Sacred Heart Medical Center for a special medical examination for sexual assault victims.

An on-call driver for Saferide said there were several parties and many people in the area where the rape occurred late Saturday night. She was in the area from 1:45 to 2 a.m. on Sunday morning picking up passengers on 18th Avenue by the cemetery.

"It bothers me that someone could get raped with so many

people around," said Tiffany Sommer, temporary driver for Saferide.

The district attorney's office expects Brooks to be indicted by a grand jury, which is the only government body that can charge a suspect with a felony.

First-degree charges of attempted rape, sexual abuse and kidnapping, which were originally listed on a news release by Eugene police, but were not included in Monday's arraignment, are still possible charges by the grand jury, said Bob Gorham, assistant district attorney.

Since Ballot Measure 11 was passed April 1995, minimum sentencing guidelines have been established for violent crimes. Brooks faces a possible minimum sentence of about seven years for the sodomy charge.

Security has been changed to \$50,000, of which only 10 percent needs to be paid for Brooks to be released. When bail is set, the full amount must be paid for a suspect to be released.

Take Back the Night, a rally created by women who want to feel safe walking in their communities at night, is scheduled for Thursday. Although the event was planned prior to the assault, organizers of the event expect an increase in participation this year as a result of Sunday's incident.

The rally, which is sponsored by the ASUO Women's Center and Sexual Assault Support Services to increase awareness about rape, will take place this Thursday at 8 p.m. in the EMU Court-yard.

It will begin with community speakers, follow with a march to the federal building on the corner of 7th Avenue and Pearl Street and close with a "Speak Out" for participants to voice their opinions.

Houses earn points throughout the week based on their participation in these events.

Kilduff said the focus of the week is to create unity among

the greek houses.

"This week is a banding together of the greek system, allowing the campus and community to see us interacting with ourselves and with others," she said.

Phillips said this week's theme, "Still Going Strong," reflects the greek system's continuity and strength.

He said Greek Week has been a University tradition since the early 1900s, and in addition to creating community inside the greek system, the week is also about creating community outside of the greek system.

"It's not fully for the greek system, it's for anyone who wants to participate," he said.

Tickets for Wednesday's variety show and greek sing are available at the EMU ticket counter today for \$5 and are \$10 at the door. Proceeds from the show will go to the AIDS Hospice and NAMES Project AIDS Memorial Quilt, Phillips said. The event begins at 6 p.m. in the EMU Ballroom.
