Eugene Mayor Candidates

This is the second story in a four-part series about the nine candidates for Eugene Mayor.



Mike Albers

"The mayoral influence at the University will be minimal at very best."

URBAN GROWTH:

Albers said people should take a step back to analyze the solutions while Hyundai is moving into the environmental district. He said he believes in short-term sustainable growth instead of long-term solutions such as the Hyundai plant in Eugene.

PUBLIC SAFETY:

Albers said he wants to dismantle the police department's Rapid Deployment Unit because the poor and the young who are on 13th Avenue with their dogs and friends should not be harassed. "It's very classist," he said. "College kids are doing the same thing."

HOMELESSNESS:

Albers said there is a need for more low-income housing, but no one wants it in their back yard. At this time there is an anti-camping ordinance. Albers wants to legalize camping so that people can sleep in the parks and in their cars without being harassed by police.

HIGHER EDUCATION:

Albers said he wants to take a realistic look at higher education. "The mayoral influence at the University will be minimal at very best."

CITY/STUDENT RELATIONSHIP:

Albers said there is little interaction between the students and the city council. "I'd like to see more students come to city council meetings," he said.

He encourages students to get out and do things in the community, such as feeding the homeless.

EXPERIENCE:

Albers is a cultural event promoter for the Antipathy Collective and a Food Not Bombs activist. He is a student at the University majoring in political science and philosophy.



James Weaver

"I'd do anything in the mayor's power to work with the University and students."

URBAN GROWTH:

Weaver said he wants to limit the growth in Eugene because it brings more congestion and decreases the quality of life.

PUBLIC SAFETY:

"I believe that we must make the city of Eugene safe from crime," Weaver said. "I'd like to see more police on the beat — on bikes and out of cars — working with people and not against them."

HOMELESSNESS:

"I believe we must develop ways to create less expensive housing — changing building codes and making land available for less expensive housing," he said.

HIGHER EDUCATION:

Weaver said he strongly supports higher education although it is funded through state taxes. "I'd do anything in the mayor's power to work with the University and students," he said.

CITY/STUDENT RELATIONSHIP:

"I would like to work personally with University students and officers," he said.

EXPERIENCE:

Weaver was a U.S. Representative in Congress in the 4th District from 1975 to 1987, and he was a builder from 1961 to 1974. He graduated from the University with a bachelor's degree in political science.

Each candidate was asked the same five questions regarding issues that affect students.
