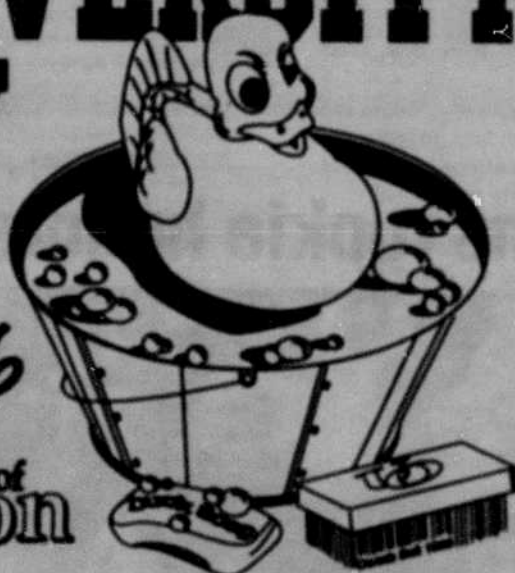

Schneider: Montreal wins with patience not money

That meant dismantling one of the most talented young squads in baseball in less than two years. Last off-season alone, Montreal traded or lost to free agency, five All-Stars, including Will Cordero, Ken Hill and Carlos Perez.

By dumping most of its high-priced talent, Montreal has the lowest payroll of any team in the last four years. The Expos only shell out \$15,410,500 for an average player salary of \$616,420.

The fiscally responsible Montreal team only has five players making more than a million dollars — compared to the Yankees' 15.

Losing the team's nucleus and having the lowest payroll in the Majors has not stopped Montreal from throwing mud in the faces of just about every baseball analyst that picked them to finish last in the National League East.

Although the season is only about a month and a half old, the overachieving Expos have the look of title contenders and not cellar-dwellers.

The secret to Montreal's success at winning games without expensive, big-name talent is patience.

The Expos were patient with outfielder Henry Rodriguez, a player cut by the Los Angeles Dodgers organization but who has blossomed into one of the most powerful young sluggers in the game.

Rodriguez is currently second in the National League with 15 home runs and tied for first with San Francisco's Barry Bonds for the RBI lead with 46.

The Expos have also been patient with young players they bring up through their farm system.

Second-baseman Mike Lansing and shortstop Mark Grudzielanek, both grown down on the Montreal farm, have developed into one of the league's best double-play combinations and are batting .323 and .359, respectively.

Montreal should be able to keep their bright, young players next year if MLB's revenue-sharing plan is approved by the Players' Union.

If revenue-sharing passes, the Expos might be able to raise their payroll as high as \$25 million.

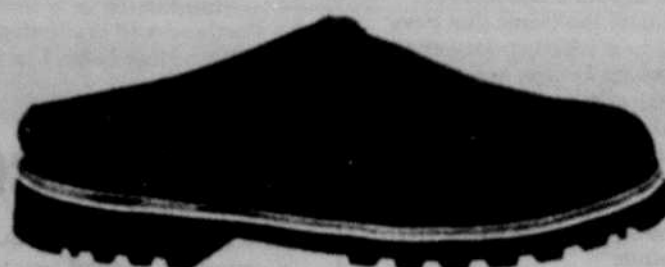
Hopefully, Major League franchises will take notice of the Expos' ability to win and not pay a small fortune to do so.

The San Diego Padres, a team leading the NL West, also proved that it is possible to win with inexpensive talent.

Perhaps the days of teams spending an arm and a leg to get ahead are over and more teams will follow the recent trend of spending little to get more.
