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## Bookstore to toast 75 years

To celebrate its 75-year anniversary, the University Bookstore is throwing a block party fashioned after another anniversary celebration in 1945.

Organizers will close 13th Avenue between Kincaid Street and Alder Street from 5 p.m. to midnight for the block party.

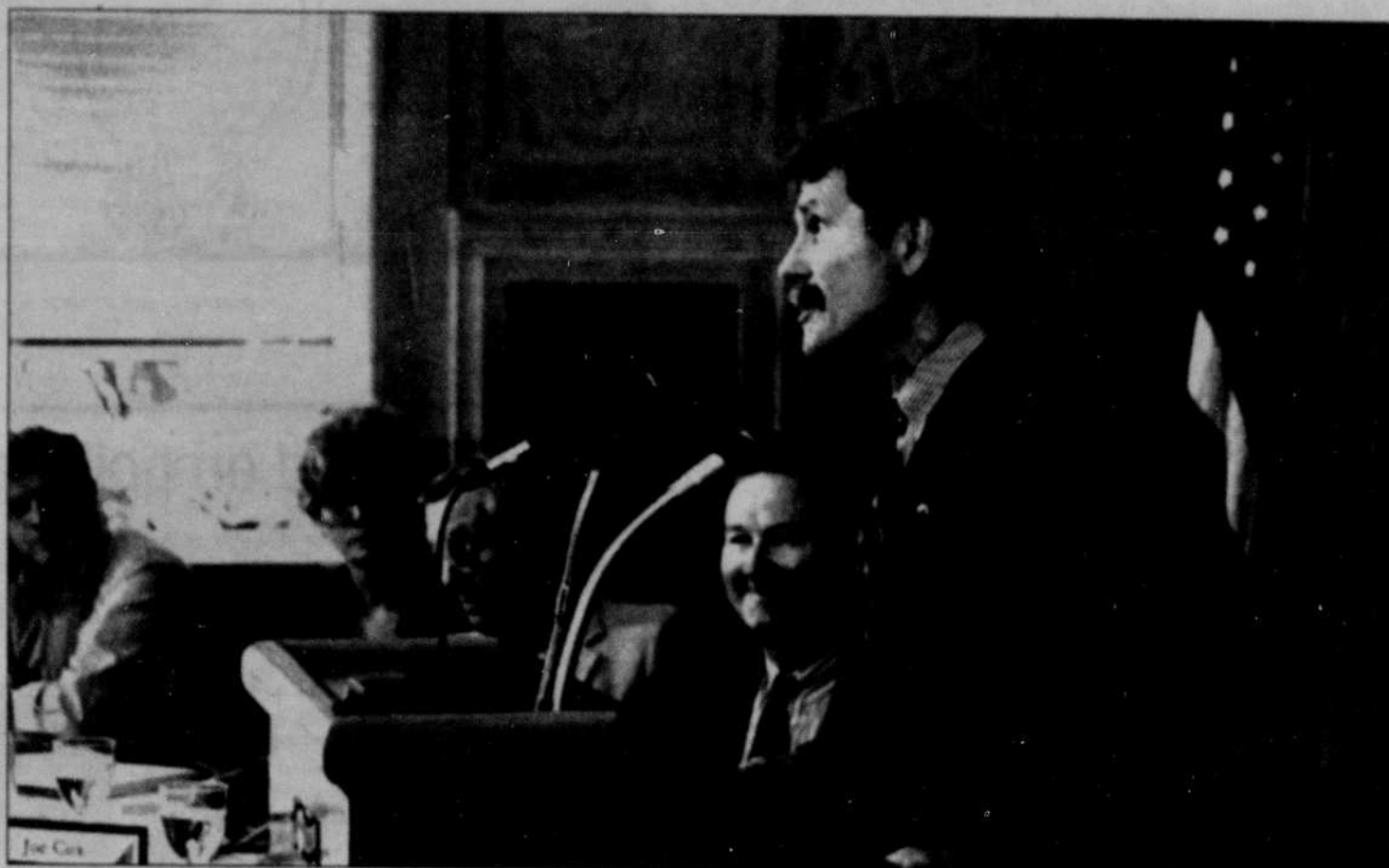

## Kitzhaber stressed removing barriers

■ **SPEECH:** The governor established a task force to provide higher education for everyone

Geographical and financial barriers that keep students from pursuing a higher education need to be alleviated, Gov. John Kitzhaber told a mix of students, faculty and community members Thursday afternoon in the Knight Library Browsing Room.

In his second major educa-

tion policy address in as many months, Kitzhaber announced the establishment of the Governor's Task Force on College Access, aimed at studying the problem some prospective college students have in getting into state institutions. The task force will be ready this fall, he said.

"Its mission will be to explore ways of eliminating barriers to access so that any Oregon high school graduate who is qualified and has the desire to attend an Oregon college is able to do so," Kitzhaber said as the crowd broke into

applause.

Undergraduate enrollment for Oregon residents decreased by more than 15 percent between 1990 and 1994.

That can be attributed, Kitzhaber said, to both financial and geographical factors.

"Even if we had sufficient capacity, there would be many students unable to pursue their education because of financial or geographical barriers," he said.

However, capacity will continue to be a problem because the state expects nearly 5,000 additional high school gradu-

ates in the next five years, Kitzhaber said. He added that post-secondary schools in Oregon cannot serve so many students.

To alleviate these problems, Kitzhaber said tuition policies and technological opportunities need to be analyzed.

Specifically, Kitzhaber said he wants to address factors that keep students who do not live along the I-5 corridor or near an eastern Oregon state college from attending one of the state's seven four-year institutions. To do that,

Clancy Thurber's! was named after former University faculty member Clancy Thurber, who is credited with rejuvenating the faculty club, which is now called the University club and spurring ren-

ovations of Collier House for the faculty club. Thurber, who taught at the University from 1966 to 1986, died in December, 1988.

"Clancy spent so much time sprucing up Collier House," said Louise Thurber, Clancy Thurber's wife. "I guess they decided to honor him by doing this."

The goal of Clancy Thurber's! is to provide a casual place for people at the University and in the community to meet and exchange ideas, said owner Joan MacDonald.

"I'm certain that in years to come, this will become the hangout on the University," said Randy McDonald, University faculty club president. "It will be a great place for members of the campus community and the broader community to collegially let their hair down a bit."

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
