Suspect whose talk with priest was taped is indicted



EUGENE (AP) — A man whose jailhouse conversation with a priest was secretly taped by authorities was indicted Thursday on charges of aggravated murder, rape and kidnapping in the slayings of three teen-agers.

Conan Wayne Hale, 20, pleaded innocent in Lane County Circuit Court and was ordered held without bail. He was already in jail awaiting trial on burglary and theft charges for allegedly stealing a gun used in the killings.

Hale is a suspect in the December shootings of three teen-agers near Springfield. The bodies were dumped along a logging road.

His case caused an uproar when District Attorney Doug Harclerod acknowledged he ordered detectives to tape a conversation between Hale and a priest.

Texan gets jail term for threatening to kill President Clinton



DALLAS (AP) — A Texan convicted for the fourth time of threatening to kill the president was sentenced Thursday to three years and five months in prison.

U.S. District Judge Jerry Buchmeyer recommended that Horace Caraker, who has a history of arrests and psychiatric hospitalizations, serve the time in a Butner, N.C., prison with a hospital, and then submit to three years' probation.

Caraker, 54, testified that he meant no harm last October when he called 911 while drunk and threatened to shoot President Clinton.

Caraker had served three- to five-year prison terms on convictions in 1975, 1983 and 1986 of threatening to kill other U.S. presidents.

With victory in reach, Netanyahu promises commitment to peace



TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Benjamin Netanyahu, nearing victory in a breathtakingly close election, sought to calm a nervous world Thursday by pledging to honor the peace commitments made to Arabs by the man he would replace, Prime Minister Shimon Peres.

Peres refused to concede defeat to his challenger, apparently clinging to the hope that the last absentee ballots, many of them cast by soldiers, would save his premiership.

With 99.9 percent of ballots counted, Netanyahu led by 21,399 votes — 1,416,280 votes to Peres' 1,394,881, or 50.3 percent to 49.7 percent, according to the Central Election Commission.

Still uncounted are 154,000 absentee ballots.

Kitzhaber said the task force would look at such alternatives as technological options.

"We are already working to create a 'virtual' or 'open university,' which, among other things, would allow us to concentrate programs in one location instead of duplicating them across several campuses," he said. "It would also give a student in say, Pendleton a chance to access the engineering program at Oregon State University."

But Kitzhaber emphasized that a "quick-fix" solution is not the answer. Rather, the task force will look at a two-step process that could provide short-term actions for the 1997-99 biennium and

could set up a six-year strategic plan aimed at a long-term solution.

"Our ultimate goal is to create the capacity for increasing numbers of Oregonians able to gain a post-secondary education regardless of where they live in the state, and regardless of family income," Kitzhaber told the audience.

Responding to Kitzhaber after the speech, ASUO president Matthew Scotten asked the Governor about a possible tuition freeze that would prevent tuition raises in the 1997-99 biennium.

While Kitzhaber did not openly support a freeze for 1997-99, he did say he would address increasing tuition costs in the

upcoming budget.

"My commitment is that I will do my best to build resources around the budget to turn the trend on tuition," Kitzhaber said. "Whether that translates into a freeze, I am not prepared to tell you right now. But I will not prepare a budget next session that doesn't have some very tangible reinvestment strategy to deal with the problem of tuition."

"I was happy with his response and I was just happy that he stopped by and checked out what we were doing," said Scotten, who was part of a tuition-freeze demonstration outside of the Knight library.

images on the walls of the bookstore and then into the sky.

"It's a chance for all of our customers to come and have a good time," Sanfilippo said. "Plus, we want to boost the image of that corner because it tends to have a bad reputation because of vagrants."

Celebrating the anniversary of the bookstore is important because of its success throughout its history, William said.

"The bookstore has definitely had its challenges since it opened, such as the depression and World War II," he said. "But it has been one of those entities that day in and day out has serviced the community in a consistent way."

In the spring of 1916 a group of students created the bookstore to provide a convenient and eco-

nomical place for University students to get books and supplies.

"Our only goal is to serve the University community," William said. "We have no other goal than that."

Students and faculty have owned the bookstore since its opening, apart from a period of two years beginning in 1918 when it was sold to cover the cost of a football contract.

The bookstore has had three general managers in the 75 years that it has been in business.

"Only having three managers adds to the stability and continuity of the organization," William said. "It shows a commitment to the community. There's quite a heritage here to celebrate."
