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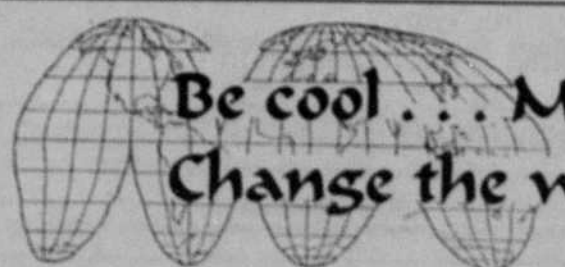

More oxygen canisters found at jet crash site

■ **SEARCH:** At least 119 containers were carried on ValuJet Flight 592 that crashed in Florida in May

MIAMI (AP) — Crews searching a crater in the Everglades for pieces of the crashed ValuJet airliner on Sunday found 10 more of the oxygen canisters that are a major focus of the investigation, Sen. Bob Graham said.

"The canisters I saw were all charred and twisted by the heat," Graham, D-Fla., said in a telephone interview after visiting the crash site.

Calls to the National Transportation Safety Board on Sunday were greeted by a taped message saying no new information would be released during the weekend. Metro Dade police said they were unaware of any specific findings at the crash site Sunday.

At least 119 of the canisters were loaded on ValuJet Flight 592, which crashed May 11 and killed all 110 people on board.

Two canister end caps found earlier showed evidence of heat damage. The canisters, which

contain a mixture of chemicals, can generate heat up to 500 degrees when they are triggered to release oxygen for passengers to breathe.

On the plane's cockpit voice recorder, pilots are heard talking about a fire in the cabin and passengers' difficulty breathing, investigators say.

The Miami Herald reported Sunday that aviation experts it consulted believe toxic gases produced by a fire involving the canisters would have killed everyone on board before the plane crashed into the Everglades. Such gases could have been poisonous enough to kill in a single breath, said the report, quoting experts who were not involved in the federal investigation.

A large backhoe, sitting on a pontoon platform alongside the crash crater Sunday, was being used to dredge the swampy crater bottom.

"We're getting everything," Joe Farrell, president of Resolve Towing & Salvage Inc., in charge of the dredge effort, told the Miami Herald.

Woman admits to posing as Whitewater juror

■ **HOAX:** A woman with the same name as one of the jurors answered questions for the media

BENTON, Ark. (AP) — A woman who gave interviews representing herself as a Whitewater juror, suggesting she took pre-trial suspicions into the jury room, now says she wasn't a juror and was just playing along with callers.

Janice Greer said she had gotten tired of calls from reporters who mistook her for a real juror who has the same name.

"I've never been on a jury," Ms. Greer said in an interview Saturday at the convenience store where she works.

Despite numerous efforts to contact her, the Janice Greer who did serve on the jury has refused to comment. She is a licensed practical nurse from Traskwood, just southeast of Benton.

After talking to the Janice Greer who was not a juror on Tuesday and Wednesday, The Associated

Press reported Thursday that she said a news article she read shortly before the trial seemed to implicate the Whitewater defendants and it "probably played a little bit of a part" in her verdict.

Gov. Jim Guy Tucker and James and Susan McDougal — former Whitewater business partners of President Clinton and first lady Hillary Rodham Clinton — were convicted of fraud and conspiracy counts Tuesday.

The woman also said she believed the Clintons were involved.

The Janice Greer who was not on the jury said Saturday she got tired of being called by reporters after the convictions were announced.

Jim Jackson, the lawyer for the non-juror Ms. Greer, said his client tried to find the real juror Janice Greer at the hospital where she works so she could refer the calls to her. But the juror could not be reached and someone else at the hospital suggested she make up stories to placate the callers.

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
