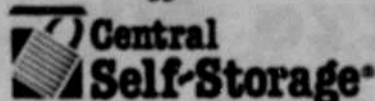


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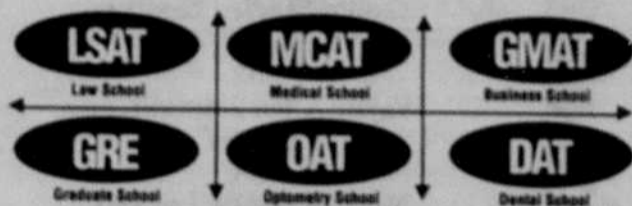
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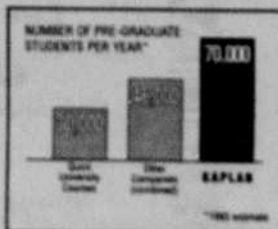

HEP students overcome obstacles

■ **GRADUATION:** All 34 students in the high school equivalency program received their GEDs

Unlike previous graduating classes, all of the 34 students who entered the High School Equivalency spring program received their Graduate Equivalence Diplomas.

"Typically, we have at least one or two students who have to leave and return the next year," said Emilio Hernandez, Jr., HEP director. "But this was a very cohesive group and they really supported each other."

The energy and skills students gain from the program increase their chance for success in future careers, said Hector Hernandez, career and placement counselor, who spoke at last night's spring graduation ceremony in the EMU Fir Room.

Graduate Martha Garcia, 16,

had to leave her 3-month-old baby with her parents in North Plains so she could attend the HEP program.

"It was really hard to leave my baby there and to get all of the homework done for my classes," Garcia said. "I went home every weekend."

She is planning on attending Oregon State University in the fall and will be studying to be either a juvenile counselor or a teacher.

More than 3,000 migrant students have graduated from HEP and received their Graduate Equivalence Diploma (GED) since the program was established at the University in 1968.

The HEP's entire budget is funded by the federal government, Hernandez said. The Department of Education approved 93 percent of coming year's program budget, he said.

Because of the funding cut, the program will have to reduce the enrollment by approximately 5 students a term, Hernandez said.

The program does not receive any University funding and none of the students pay tuition because they fall below the poverty line, Hernandez said.

Students are recruited from along the west coast and Idaho, said April Thompson, recruiting assistant.

"There is no HEP program in California," Thompson said. "We have some students coming all the way from San Diego."

HEP's 5-year funding authorization expires at the end of 1997. Starting in July, Hernandez and representatives from the other 22 programs across the country, will begin gathering letters in support of a contract renewal.

"With the positive climate in this country concerning the need to educate all children, we have some good support in the Senate," Hernandez said. "But it is going to be difficult. I think we have about a 50-50 chance of winning."
