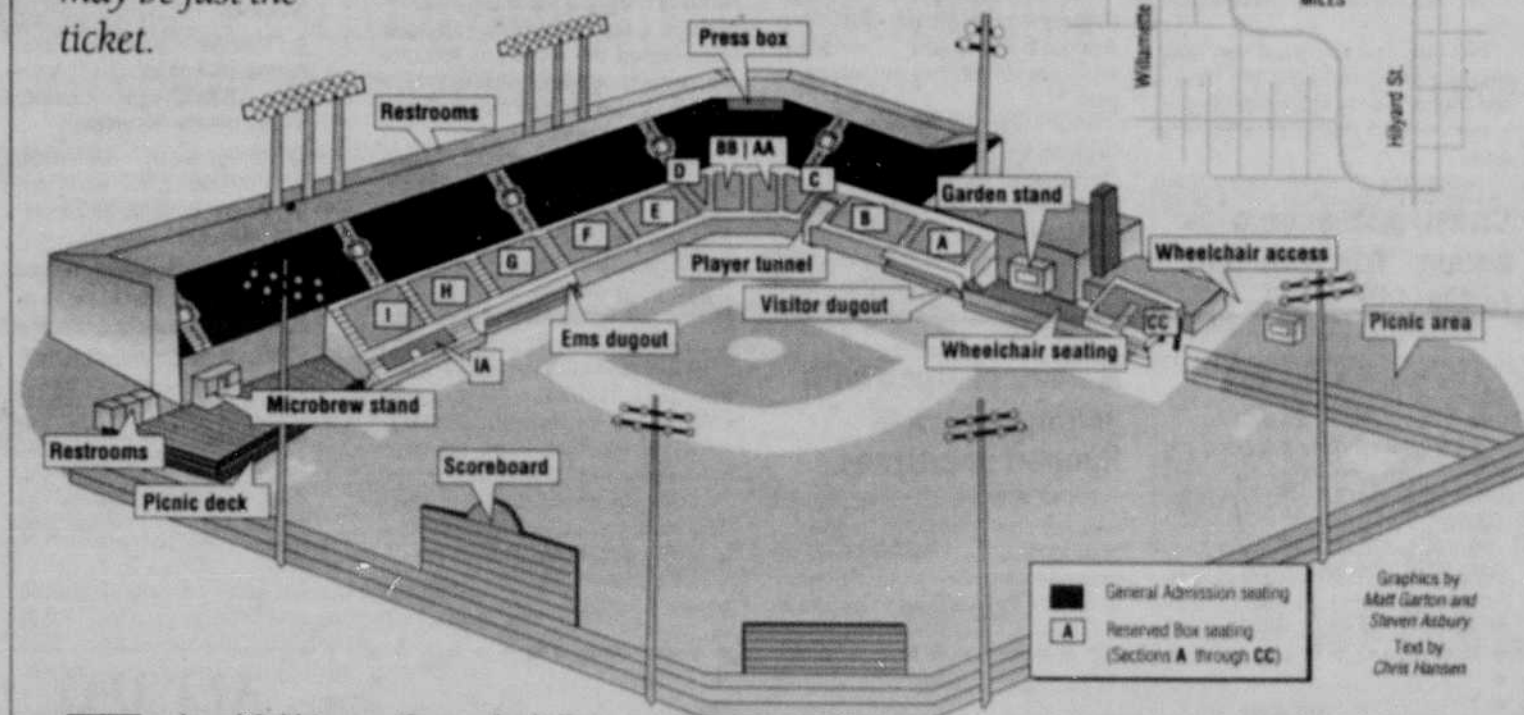

After six months of planning, Oregon's public colleges and universities are about to undergo some major changes.

The Oregon State System of Higher Education last week adopted new strategies to make Oregon higher education more competitive and efficient, said Board President Les Swanson, Jr.

"We are at a critical time in the history of Oregon higher education, and changes that are fundamental in nature must be made in order to provide for the future," he said.
