Lecture will address corporate downsizing

The University of Oregon Labor Education and Research Center will be sponsoring a free public talk from labor analyst and author Jane Slaughter on Wednesday at 3 p.m.

Slaughter is an outspoken critic of corporate downsizing and a long-time analyst of the auto industry, labor-management and workplace changes.

She has also written two books and hundreds of articles concerning the American workplace and its employees.

Her books, "Working Smart: A Union Guide to Participation Plans and Re-Engineering" and "Choosing Sides: Unions and the Team Concept," were both published by a pro-labor publishing house.

Slaughter will be speaking on "Longer Hours and Contingent Workers: Is This What We Call Corporate Competitiveness." The lecture will focus on America's growing contingent, contract and part-time work force and how the changing of work schedules affects the time spent away from the workplace.
