Government may have Cooley on file as Vet

1 BEND (AP) — The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs has a file that may prove whether Rep. Wes Cooley served in the Korean War — but the Oregon Republican has no plans to make it public.
The *Bulletin* newspaper in Bend asked Cooley for permission to inspect the file, but he refused verbal and written requests despite a public promise to release his Army records.
Cooley is being investigated for his claim in the state Voters' Pamphlet that he served in Korea.

Fires still burning throughout the West

2 LEHI, Utah — Fire crews in Utah battled strong, erratic winds Wednesday that spread the flames of several wildfires.
In Arizona, all but three of the state's 10 major fires were contained. The 16,250-acre Hochderffer fire burned just northwest of Flagstaff, while two separate blazes in the Kaibab National Forest north of the Grand Canyon charred more than 27,300 acres.
In New Mexico, containment lines of the 366-acre Nicole fire held despite swirling winds in the Jemez Mountains.

Bombing victims left out of pretrial hearing

3 DENVER (AP) — Victims and relatives who will testify in the Oklahoma City bombing trial were barred from the courtroom Wednesday by the judge, who said the mere sight of the two men accused of killing their loved ones could taint their testimony.
Although witnesses are usually banned from trials and pretrial hearings until they testify, prosecutors had asked for an exception for the victims. They maintained that the victims' presence in court during the guilt-or-innocence phase of the trial would not affect their testimony during the penalty phase.



Hubble captures new star formations

4 NEW YORK (AP) — The Hubble Space Telescope has spotted what may be the most distant objects ever recorded, gazing billions of years into the past to produce baby pictures of what could be the first generation of stars.
The stars are blurred together in images of embryonic galaxies captured as they appeared when the universe was less than 1 billion years old, researcher Kenneth Lanzetta said. That could be about 14 billion years ago, given plausible assumptions about the universe's expansion, he said.

Cop dragged by stolen car, still kills thieves

5 PITTSBURGH (AP) — A police officer, his hand trapped in the door of a stolen car, shot and killed two of its occupants Wednesday as he was dragged nearly a mile.
The flesh on one of Officer John Wilbur's legs was scraped to the bone as he bounced repeatedly from the street to the trunk of the speeding car, police said.
Wilbur, 28, was in serious condition after four hours of surgery at the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center.

'Flying Elvis' dies while trying to land

6 QUINCY, Mass. (AP) — Four "Flying Elvises" trying to sky-dive into a parking lot to entertain a crowd were blown off course, crashing onto land and into Boston Harbor.
One died today and another was hospitalized.
The four stuntmen, who were costumed in fringed white jumpsuits with slicked-back hair and sunglasses, were supposed to swoop over the crowd for the grand opening of a nightclub on the harbor.
