

# Bombing: 85-foot wide crater remains

 schedule today to fly to Dhahran to visit the wounded and victims' families.

"Anyone who attacks one American attacks all Americans," Clinton said as he prepared to leave for an economic summit in Lyons, France. "We will not rest in our efforts to find whoever is responsible for this outrage, to pursue them and to punish them."

The Saudi government resolved to "punish the perpetrators" and offered a \$2.7 million reward for information leading to arrests.

No group has claimed responsibility for the bombing. But last month, the Saudis beheaded four Muslim militants convicted of exploding a car bomb Nov. 13 at a U.S.-run military training facility in Riyadh. Five Americans and two Indians died.

Underground extremists had threatened to attack U.S. interests in Saudi Arabia if the four were punished.

A U.S. airman in an observation tower had reported a suspicious fuel truck stopped outside the compound, about 35 yards from

the nearest building. When a Saudi officer approached, two men jumped out and drove off in a car, a senior Defense Department official said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

Authorities tried to evacuate two nearby apartment buildings, the official said. But the bomb went off a couple of minutes later, at 10:30 p.m. (3:30 p.m. EDT), before people could get out.

"I heard a deafening noise and then the windows shattered and the walls fell in," said Staff Sgt. Tyler Christie, 31, of Fort Walton Beach, Fla., who was slightly injured.

The source of the explosion was believed to have been the fuel truck — packed with 2 1/2 tons of explosives. It left a crater 35 feet deep and 85 feet wide.

Technical Sgt. Patrick P. Fennig, 34, died in blast. His father said Patrick had expected to return soon to Greendale, Wis.

"I received a Father's Day card from him saying he would be coming home from Dhahran tomorrow, maybe earlier," Ted Fennig said from his home in the Milwau-

kee suburb.

The death toll made it the worst terrorist blast involving Americans in the Middle East since the 1983 barracks bombing in Beirut, Lebanon, which killed 241 American servicemen.

Dhahran, on the Persian Gulf coast, was the site of the worst U.S. loss in the Gulf War in 1991. An Iraqi Scud missile hit a U.S. barracks Feb. 25, 1991, killing 28.

Officials said the Air Force's 4404th Air Wing is based at the site. At least 2,000 Americans are stationed there. The main U.S. Air Force units are from Eglin Air Force Base, Fla.; Hill Air Force Base, Utah; Shaw Air Force Base, S.C.; Cannon Air Force Base, N.M., and Little Rock Air Force Base, Ark.

# Housing: Unit size and price increased

Residents of Spencer View will notice other significant changes in their living conditions. A two-bedroom apartment at Amazon cost approximately \$200 a month. Spencer View residents will be paying \$435 for a new two-bedroom apartment.

Although more expensive, the new units are more than 150 square feet larger than their predecessors. The increase in costs doesn't seem to have deterred students from making plans to live at Spencer View. Gaddini said.

"People have made reservations for nearly all the two-bedroom units and many of the three-bedroom units," Gaddini said.

### Adjusting to change

The transition from Amazon to Spencer View has not been easy for everyone. The former Amazon Cop Child Care has been in a state of limbo since Saturday, said Suzi Blanchard, director of Spencer Cop Family Center.

The childcare center, which has a summer enrollment of 62 children, moved last weekend from Amazon to a temporary stay at Westmoreland Family Housing Community Center.

"We're in the orphanage stage of our new life," Blanchard said. "The whole process is a little unsettling. This has been very traumatic for the Amazon kids. Being in a different space with the same teachers is real confusing for many of them."

The childcare center will be at Westmoreland through the end of August. Meanwhile, teachers and kids alike are trying to deal with their new surroundings.

"We're trying to adjust," said preschool teacher Kristen Leadem. "We'll probably be in the swing of things by the time we move out."

Rather than share a communal area as they did at Amazon, toddlers, pre-schoolers, infants and school-age kids have been divided up into different areas at the Westmoreland facilities.

"The staff and kids used to be connected, and we're not anymore," Blanchard said. "I miss all the kids. I don't get to see all of them because I'm on a different side of the facility."

"We're looking forward to getting into the new place," she said. "After all this time, we're ready for some closure."
