## Military expands wall for added security

**1** DHAHRAN, Saudi Arabia (AP) — Using forklifts to position concrete barriers, workers expanded the security wall around the bombed U.S. military housing complex Monday.

The new wall and other security measures are scheduled to be completed this week to better protect the 2,000 American troops living at the complex. The security perimeter was 80 feet away from the complex when a bomb-laden fuel truck exploded June 25, killing 19 Americans.

## Three whites arrested for black church fire

**2** CHESTERFIELD, Va. (AP) — Three white teen-agers were arrested in an April 16 fire that destroyed a black church building.

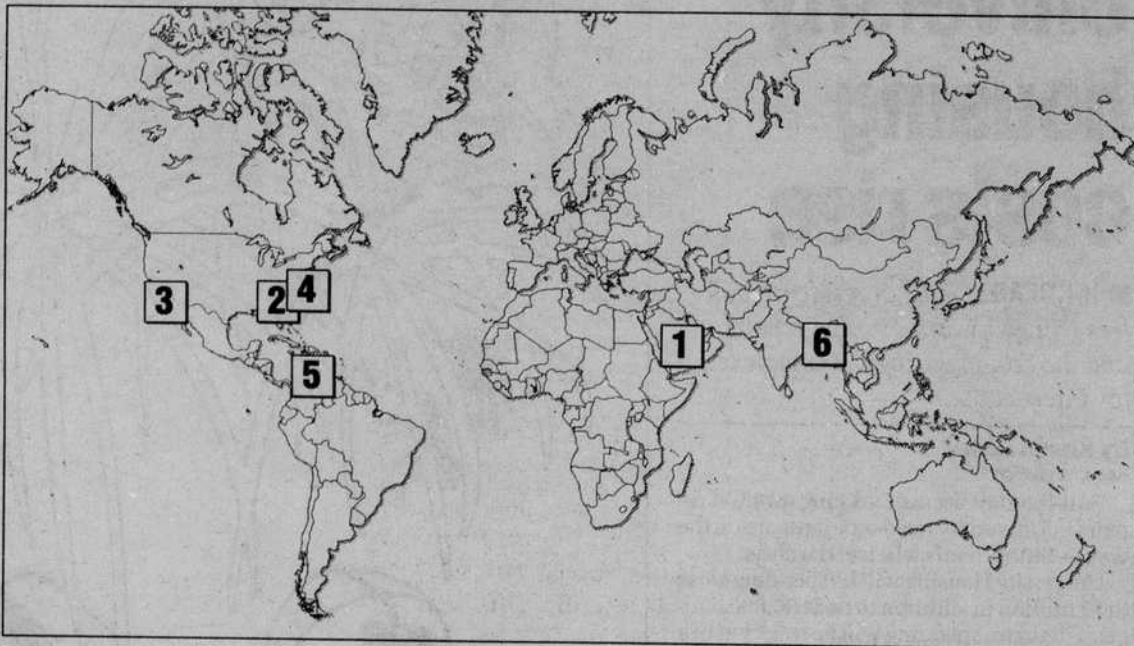
Investigators have no evidence the fire was racially motivated or linked to any other arson, said Bill Dunham, agent in charge of the Richmond office of the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms.

Suspicious fires have hit more than 40 black churches in the South in the past 18 months.

## Firefighters have their hands full in California

**3** IDYLLWILD, Calif. (AP) — An estimated 1,000 firefighters mounted an air and ground assault to protect a Southern California mountain resort from flames crackling through the dry brush Monday.

Nineteen aircraft bombarded the flames with fire retardant and water. On the ground, firefighters working in temperatures over 100 degrees cut down vegetation to try to halt the fire. The fire was ignited Saturday by a ricocheting bullet fired by a target shooter.



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## Communications Act injunction appealed

**4** PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The Justice Department appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court Monday to lift an injunction blocking the Communications Decency Act.

Three federal judges issued the injunction June 12, saying that the law violates constitutional freedoms of speech.

The government used a fast-track clause built into the act to file its appeal directly to the Supreme Court. The contested law makes it a crime to display "indecent" and "patently offensive" material in online areas accessible to minors.

## Police fire wounds seven in Haitian town

**5** PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP) — Police opened fire on a crowded dance floor after an argument broke out between two policewomen quarreling over a man, a radio report said Monday. Seven people were wounded.

The shooting occurred Saturday night in Corail, a coastal town about 150 miles west of the capital, Radio Haiti-Inter said. The police officers had come from Port-au-Prince to participate in a festival. Seven people were wounded, including the band leader, and four were hospitalized, the radio report said.

## Tornado hits southern coast of Bangladesh

**6** COX'S BAZAR, Bangladesh (AP) — A tornado struck an island on Bangladesh's southern coast Monday, destroying hundreds of mud-and-thatch huts and injuring at least 100 people.

The three-minute storm hit Kutubdia island at dawn and flattened three villages, police said.

Kutubdia is an 8-square-mile island inhabited by nearly 100,000 people, mainly fishermen, 185 miles south of Dhaka, the Bangladesh capital.

The region is often hit by cyclones roaring in from the Bay of Bengal.

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
