Dinosaur ride breaks; spits hydraulic fluid

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The fearsome "Jurassic Park" ride at Universal Studios malfunctioned a week after its debut, spraying about 150 riders with hydraulic fluid. Four people were treated at the hospital for minor injuries.

The fluid — used to drive some of the \$110 million ride's machinery — doused guests as they sat strapped in their boat seats Saturday.

The attraction was shut down for about 90 minutes until workers located the leak. To make amends, Universal said, it put some of the guests up in hotels and bought them new clothes.

"We're well-accepted out in California," Buttafuoco said Monday. "They have a different attitude there. ... I'm not this image built up by the media."

On an earlier trek to Hollywood, he was arrested for allegedly soliciting sex from an undercover cop on Sunset Boulevard.

"I'm not a bad guy," Buttafuoco said. "I'm just a regular kind of guy."

MONSON, Mass. (AP) — Swimming holes, baseball games and summer jobs beckoned, but schoolchildren in nine small New England towns had to wait for summer vacation perhaps

longer than anyone else in the country.

A record 12 feet of snow — including the Northeast Blizzard of '96 — caused 10 school-day cancellations in Monson, all of which had to be made up at the end of the year.

On Monday at 2:08 p.m., the last bell rang, three days short of the Fourth of July.

"This is the last study hall in America," freshman Nate Jette said during his last-period class.

The National Education Association said the western Massachusetts community in the rolling hills along the Connecticut state line may have been the last to break for summer.

It was the last day of school for about 1,200 students from kindergarten through 11th grade. The 200 or so seniors finished up about two weeks ago.

While snowy states such as Pennsylvania and Connecticut require public schools to finish by June 30, no such law exists in Massachusetts. The New Haven, Conn., schools closed on Friday, and the last district in Maryland to close was Baltimore, which ended classes on June 20.



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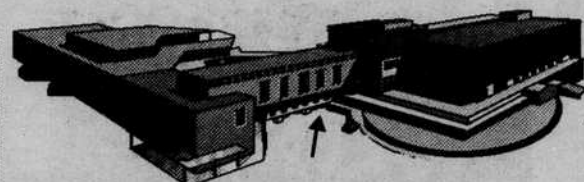
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
