

Two Cuban Olympians seek asylum

■ **OLYMPICS:** Two champion boxers bring politics to Summer Games arena

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Just weeks before they would represent Cuba at the Olympics, two champion boxers applied for asylum Monday, becoming political rather than athletic symbols.

"This was a purely political decision," said Al Rogers, a spokesman for the law firm representing Ramon Garbey and Joel Casamayor, both 22. "They very easily could have won the gold and then defected, but they chose not to fight Castro's war."

Garbey and Casamayor slipped away last week during free time while the 12-member Cuban team was training in Mexico.

For the past few days the boxers worked closely with Frank Ronzio, an immigration attorney and boxing manager. They met in a hotel in the border city of Tijuana, Mexico, to discuss their options, Rogers said.

"We did our homework. We wanted this to be dealt with in a smooth, professional matter," Rogers said.

The only snag came Sunday night when the men appeared at the San Ysidro port of entry to turn

themselves in and the office did not have an asylum officer on duty, according to Rogers and another spokesperson for the men.

"They were scared," Rogers said. "I think they feared the Cubans were looking for them."

The boxers were told they could return to their hotel room in Tijuana and appear at the port the next morning, but they declined. Immigration officials then took them to the processing center in El Centro, 115 miles east of the port of entry.

The INS traditionally transfers individuals seeking political asylum to the El Centro center where detention hearings usually take place.

Speaking to The Associated Press by telephone from the men's parole hearing in El Centro Monday afternoon, Rogers said their attorney was asking that they be allowed to live in Los Angeles while their application was processed.

The hearing lasted for several hours Monday and will continue Tuesday, according to Hector Nájera, officer in charge of the INS's El Centro office.

The men have no family in the United States, Rogers said. Casamayor, who comes from Guantanamo, Cuba, left behind his 8-year-old daughter and her

mother. Casamayor and the woman have been separated for some time, Rogers said.

Garbey also left a child on the Caribbean island, a son. He is not married.

The men followed the lead of Cuban baseball players who have defected to play professionally in the United States.

Casamayor, who has fought at 125 pounds, captured a gold medal at the Barcelona Olympics in 1992. Garbey was the 1993 world champion at 176 pounds.

Garbey reportedly disappeared June 23 after he was given permission to go shopping. Casamayor reportedly vanished on Friday.

The boxers say they feared they would be persecuted in Cuba for their resistance to supporting the communist government. Rogers did not know if the men were members of the UJC, the communist youth movement there.

The Cuban team will remain in Mexico before leaving for Atlanta, team spokesman Miguel Barrientos said.

The desertions also follow the defections of more than 40 athletes and officials from Cuba's delegation to the 1993 Central American and Caribbean Games in Puerto Rico.

Graf wins, blows up at commentator's remarks

■ **TENNIS:** Steffi Graf's feud with Martina Navratilova continues

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Steffi Graf beat one Martina and took a swipe at another at Wimbledon on an irritating day of testy tempers, too much rain and too little tennis.

Graf turned in one of her best performances of the tournament Monday in a 6-1, 6-4 rout of Martina Hingis to reach the quarterfinals, then turned on the Swiss teen's namesake, Martina Navratilova, for implying that Graf exaggerated her injuries.

"She's lucky she doesn't have to live with them," Graf said icily. "I think she should know better than to say these things."

Relations between Graf and Navratilova have been frosty since Wimbledon last year, when they were scheduled to play doubles together before Graf backed out at the last minute. Navratilova was left

without a partner and no chance to tie Billie Jean King's record of 20 overall Wimbledon titles.

Their tiff continued recently when Graf won the French Open for her 19th Grand Slam singles title, surpassing Navratilova's total, and reportedly felt miffed by not receiving a congratulatory note from her.

While commenting for HBO last week, Navratilova said Graf's latest problem, a swollen tendon in her left kneecap, was "an excuse ahead of time just in case she needs it."

"If you read the newspapers, you'd think she belongs in the hospital," said Navratilova.

Graf, who has been wearing a brace in practice and a small white bandage on her knee in matches, said "I wish the things she says were true. I don't like to talk about injuries, or use it as an excuse."

Graf will next meet No. 6 Jana Novotna, who lost to her in the 1993 Wimbledon final.
