Olympics: 200 meters awaits Johnson on Wednesday

down his face. His lips quivered. The emotion that lies beneath his cold stare on the track was finally there for all to see.

Throughout the preliminaries, Johnson treated his body as if it were a fast race car. He'd test it on high speeds on the curves, then coast to the finish. He'd make sure he was behind down the final stretch, turn it on for 50 meters, then shut it down again.

Finally, on Monday night, he had his foot to the floor.

As usual, he left the field far behind on the third 100 meters, his arms churning, the gold chain around his neck beating against his chest, his torso almost perfectly upright in a style reminiscent of Jesse Owens.

Roger Black of Britain was a distant second.

"To beat Michael I have to run a perfect race and he has to make a mistake," Black said. "And Michael doesn't make mistakes. At least I've never seen him do it."

Tens of thousands of flash bulbs went off in the stands as Johnson stretched the lead to at least 10

meters at the finish. His time was 43.49 seconds, an Olympic record, but short of Butch Reynolds' world record of 43.29.

"I just gave it all I had coming home and it worked out as far as winning the race, but as far as breaking the world record, it just wasn't there today," Johnson said.

It was his 55th victory in a row in the 400. He hasn't been beaten since Feb. 24, 1989.

Now it's on to the 200, where it should be a lot tougher. Waiting will be Frankie Fredericks, who beat Johnson last month.

"I have to hold back in the 400. But now I'll be able to do a lot of what comes natural to me, and that is to sprint and just go all out," he said.

Johnson wore a T-shirt that said "Danger Zone" to the post-race interview room.

"That's the mind set I'm in right now," he said. "I definitely have to have that now. The 200 is a completely different race. It's more aggressive. Guys are already talking about what they're going to do to me, thinking that I'm going to be easier to beat because I ran the 400. That's a big mistake."

the youthful Mets. "Baerga will step right into the middle of our lineup and bring something that we lack — leadership. This makes us a better team right now," he said.

Vizcaino and Kent, both 28, said the trade moves them from a team well out of the playoff picture to one expected to repeat as AL champions.

"Jose and I have proved that we were the best double play combination," said Kent. "We can do the same thing for the Indians this year and help them go to the World Series. That's the goal of every player."

Vizcaino is expected to move

into Baerga's spot at second base.

"The last couple of years I proved that I'm a day-to-day player," he said. "Jeff and I will help them in the world series and in the future."

Vizcaino, moved from short-stop to second base this season so the Mets could play rookie sensation Rey Ordonez every day, has responded with his best season. He's hitting .303 with six triples, one home run and 32 RBI.

Baerga and Vizcaino are both under contract through next season. Kent will be eligible for arbitration after this season, and Espinoza's contract runs out at the conclusion of the 1996 season.


