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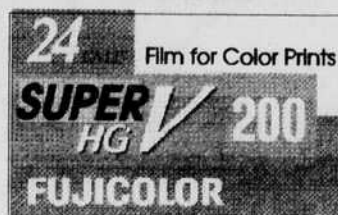
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Lead in food replaced by lead in head

FEDERALSBURG, Md. (AP) — Inside the clapboard farmhouse where she ran a day-care center, Carolann Pollard spent a year trying to poison her husband by sprinkling lead powder on his food, police say.

The poison made James Pollard sick enough to take disability leave from his job, but it apparently wasn't killing him fast enough for her, police said.

So, police say, she shot him to death.

The case has shocked neighbors in this rural town on the Chesapeake Bay's Eastern Shore. And parents are worried that the children attending Mrs. Pollard's day-care center may have been poisoned.

According to court documents, a frightened Mrs. Pollard called 911 in the early morning of July 22, saying that she had heard shots outside after her husband went out to investigate a noise in their yard.

Police found her husband's body near a shed behind the house and initially thought a prowler was responsible for the 38-year-old Pollard's slaying.

But investigators say Mrs. Pollard, 40, later admitted that she had shot the man she married a little more than a year ago. She was

Pollard's third wife.

And, according to police, she added that she was responsible for the mysterious illness that had been plaguing her husband for months.

Police and prosecutors refused to comment on a motive.

Pollard had told co-workers he was feeling tired, had aches in his joints and had trouble concentrating. He also had serious headaches in the last year, said James Horn, Pollard's boss at Confidential Services Inc., a security business. That was unusual for Pollard, Horn said.

"I bet in 16 years he hadn't missed three days. He was phenomenal. He was a big husky fellow. He was really healthy," Horn said.

Pollard's case puzzled doctors for a time, but they eventually diagnosed him as having lead poisoning and had been conducting tests to find out where the toxin was coming from.

Although police say she has confessed, defense attorney Harry Walsh said Mrs. Pollard — who is being held without bail — would plead innocent to the charges of murder and poisoning.

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
