2. Persons with long-term heart or lung problems.
3. Persons with any of the following: kidney disease, cystic fibrosis, diabetes, anemia, severe asthma and conditions which compromise immune mechanism.

Influenza vaccine may be given to persons wishing to reduce their chances of catching the flu, persons who provide essential community services and students or others in schools or colleges.

Oregon struggles in Washington

■ **VOLLEYBALL:** The Ducks are still winless in Pac-10 competition

A rough week was capped off by an even rougher weekend for the Ducks as they traveled to Washington to face two nationally-ranked teams minus four key starters.

Oregon (6-10 overall, 0-6 in the Pacific-10 Conference) faced No. 18 Washington on Friday night with only nine players available due to NCAA suspensions handed down earlier in the week.

The Huskies made quick work of Oregon, outscoring the Ducks 15-3, 15-2 and 15-8 to take the

match. Makare Desilets had Oregon's number all night as she racked up 17 kills for a .773 attack percentage.

The Ducks' hitting suffered during the match as the team hit .054, including only 28 kills as opposed to Washington's 49 kills and .354 hitting percentage.

Junior middle blocker Dani Cordova, who got the start due to the suspension of junior Tia Stewart, led the Ducks with a .353 hitting percentage. Sophomore middle blocker Alli White had a team-high nine kills.

Sophomore Lindsay Mayer got her first collegiate start at setter due to the absence of junior Casey Crisler, and junior outside hitters Alison Pepe and Shelby Edwards started in the place of senior Amy

Barnes and sophomore Madeline Ernst. All nine players who traveled north saw action.

The Ducks struggled again on Saturday night, when they faced No. 10 Washington State. Offense was again a sore point for Oregon, as the team hit .036 for the match.

The first game was within the Ducks' reach at 11-7, but the Cougars scored four-straight points to win it. The second and third games didn't go as well as Oregon hoped either as the Ducks fell 15-5 and 15-4 to lose the match.

Pepe led Oregon with 10 kills while Washington State's Sarah Silvernail had 17 kills and Shannon Wyckoff had 12.

Oregon plays California and Stanford at home this weekend.

"I am just happy to come away with a win," head coach Bill Steffen said. "There has been a couple of games where we dominated play but didn't put it in and ended up losing. I am happy to actually put a chance away and come away with a win."

Against Gonzaga freshman forward Sierra Marsh scored the only goal of the game on an assist by freshman defender Sara Morishige in the 37th

minute.

"We got the ball around and we passed much better today than last week," Marsh said of the win.

Fox scored her second shutout of the season.

"We played tough today and had to work for it," Fox said. "We were not content with what happened last week. We felt like we deserved to win and we played with that in mind."

Oregon's next match will not be until Oct. 20 when Oklahoma comes to Eugene to face the Ducks.

Football: Injuries took toll on thin Oregon squad

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"They did a great job of taking advantage of their opportunities."

And his explanation for his team's third-quarter collapse?

"We started out the second half under the worst circumstances, handing it to them three and out right away," Bellotti said. "We ran out of gas. I'm not sure if it was a physical or a mental thing."

While the UCLA offense was able to take advantage of its opportunities, the Oregon offense failed to capitalize on its chances and failed to control the ball, forcing the Oregon defense to be on the field for close to 40 minutes.

"We're a little mad and upset with each other," said Oregon quarterback Ryan Perry-Smith, who completed only 44 percent of his passes for 221 yards and one touchdown. "We feel like we lost another opportunity."

Oregon linebacker Reggie Jordan was visibly upset after the game and talked about his disappointment in the second-half performance after an emotional half-time for the Ducks.

"We came together and held hands as a team. It was real inspirational. But we just didn't execute that inspiration in the second half," Jordan said.

It would be hard to say if inspiration was what the Ducks needed in the third quarter. A deeper bench would probably have been more beneficial.

"We just kept pounding and pounding because we knew sooner or later the holes would open up," Hicks said. "You could tell by the look on their faces that they were getting tired."

With injuries keeping out key players, Oregon just ran out of healthy bodies to stick in the game.

The Ducks, still in search of their first conference win, will play Stanford Saturday in Palo Alto.
