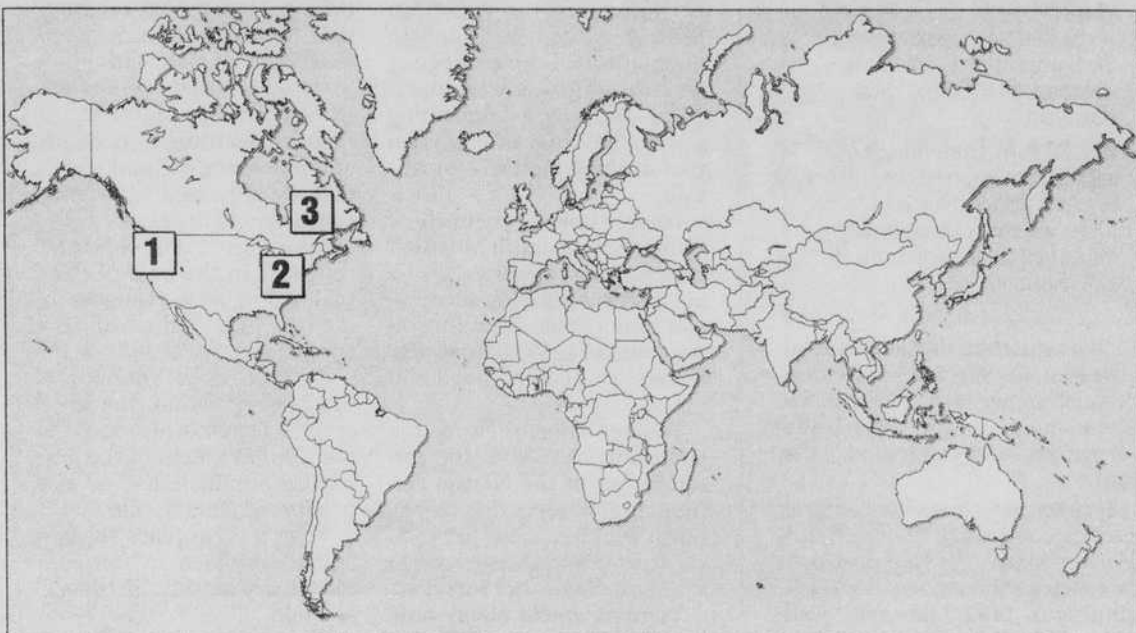

## Bomb threat diverts plane to Dayton, Ohio

**1** DAYTON, Ohio — A USAir flight from Philadelphia to Los Angeles was diverted to Dayton on Sunday after a passenger said he had a bomb, the FBI said.

Agents arrested Richard Allan Josephson, 37, of Wilmington, Del., and charged him with making a bomb threat, said FBI agent James Samples. If convicted, he faces up to 20 years in prison.

No bomb was found on USAir Flight 17, with 109 people aboard, after it landed without incident around 10:30 a.m., but eight people got bumps and bruises evacuating on an emergency slide, an airport spokeswoman said.

James M. Cox International Airport remained open during the incident, and USAir brought in another plane to continue the flight.

Josephson was held without bond and a detention hearing was set for Wednesday.

## Passenger dies in cable car plunge

**2** QUEBEC — A cable car broke loose this weekend, hurling passengers into a wall at the bottom of the steep run in a Quebec City historical area.

A British tourist was killed and 15 people were injured.

The accident happened Saturday when a cable that pulls the car along a track between Quebec City's historic lower town and a cliff, snapped.

An emergency brake failed to stop the car, which sped out of control and smashed into the wall of a booth where passengers enter and exit the car.

The 12 women and four men aboard the cable car sustained fractures, bruises and were in shock; one was more seriously hurt, authorities said.

## DEQ plans hearing on airport dumping

**3** PORTLAND — The Oregon Department of Environmental Quality plans a public hearing on a temporary permit that allows Portland International Airport to dump antifreeze into the already polluted Columbia Slough.

DEQ water quality spokesman Ed Sale said the hearing was ordered after about 30 citizens asked that the permit be reviewed.

The permit, known as a "Stipulated Consent Order," covers aircraft and runway de-icing operations for at least six months while the Port of Portland and the state prepare a federal water pollution permit.

Portland's airport has for years dumped antifreeze and de-icing chemicals into the slough, although it is a violation of the federal Clean Water Act.
