Basketball teams help raise money, awareness

■ **CANCER:** The "Three Point Attack" program earns money through pledges

Three-point shots made by the University men's and women's basketball teams will add up to money for cancer research and education this season as part of the Coaches vs. Cancer fund-raiser.

The University is participating in the Coaches vs. Cancer "Three Point Attack" program to raise money and awareness about cancer, said Jerry Green, coach for the men's basketball team.

"I don't think this is something

research has gotten very far on," said Jerry Green, coach for the men's basketball team. "Sometimes I feel tied down because I don't see much a layman like myself can do but try to raise funds."

Coaches vs. Cancer is a national fund-raiser started in 1993 by Missouri basketball coach Norm Stewart. Over 170 colleges and universities participated in the "Three Point Attack" program last year and raised over \$1 million.

"I don't know how much we will raise this year, but if we make \$5,000 for the first year, I'll be happy," Jeanne Havercroft, special events director for the American Cancer Association.

People pledge a certain amount of money — a quarter, dime or

nickel — for each three-point shot made during the regular basketball season, Havercroft said.

Pledge forms can be picked up from the American Cancer Society, outside MacArthur Court and at any US Bank or Centennial Bank.

"The fund-raiser is during the Pac-10 season," Havercroft said. "They can sign up any time before the final game of the season."

Funds raised during the basketball season will be used in Eugene for cancer research and education programs for cancer survivors and families.

"Cancer touches so many people, there are very few people who don't know someone with cancer," Havercroft said. "It is an

epidemic and you just can't do enough research or education on it."

Eugene has a number of programs for cancer including programs providing transportation to appointments and treatments, support groups for survivors of cancer and wigs and cosmetics for patients having radiation and chemotherapy treatment.

"Our Eugene office is really fortunate because there are so many programs for cancer patients and their families," Havercroft said. "However, it is frustrating because we have these great programs but it doesn't do any good if we can't reach people. That's why education is important."

New fraternity joins greek system, seeks new members

There are some new boys in town, and the University greek system is about to see some changes.

A chapter of the fraternity Delta Sigma Phi has started up at the University, paving the way for the admission of new greek members and some potential changes to the greek system, Greek Advisor Evelyn Jones said.

"We're real excited for several

reasons," she said. "The type of people who join new fraternities are risk takers, innovative and want to set the mold. The expansion [of the current greek system] also puts out a lot of hype, paraphernalia and talk. It sparks a lot of interest in the greek system."

With the arrival of Delta Sigma Phi now and of Pi Kappa Phi, another fraternity, in January, Jones said she expects about 100 new men will be participating in the greek system.

"Expansion is a wake-up call," she said. "These new guys are coming in, and if [other fraternities] are not living up to [their] values, it's gonna be kind of a kick in

their pants.

The University chapter of Delta Sigma Phi is the only chapter of its kind in Oregon. The fraternity sponsored a colony at Oregon State University, but the group folded due to low membership numbers.

"We're one of the only major national fraternities not represented at the University," said Scott Rich, director of expansion for Delta Sigma Phi. "We're going to be a good addition to the existing greek system."

Meanwhile, Rich is currently working on recruitment for the new fraternity. There are 130 chapters of Delta Sigma Phi in the

country, he said.

"We are a general, social men's fraternity with a strong focus on leadership, scholarship and community service," he said. "We want to make sure we have a strong foundation and really concentrate on the leadership and scholarship parts. I want to get guys [who are] serious in school and welcome the challenge of starting something new. The social brotherhood aspect will fall in line from there."

Rich said he is shooting for a start-up recruitment of 30 men.

"But we're not just taking everybody," he said. "We're being pretty selective."



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
