Violence: Abuse victims are not at fault

from public humiliation to threatening people, pets or possessions the victim cares about.

Physical, emotional, sexual and economic abuse are all ways one person can use power to control the other person, she said.

"Abuse isn't just being punched in the face," Patrick said. "It's when someone doesn't respect your limits."

For women who think they may be in an abusive relationship, there are several warning signs.

"If your partner isolates you, if you have to account for all your time, if he's overly protective or jealous, that's a warning," Inman said.

A partner who wants to make all the decisions for the relation-

ship, a relationship that becomes intense very quickly and a fear of ending the relationship are other warning signs.

"You know something's not right when you're afraid to break up," she said.

Students who see someone in an abusive relationship can help by telling the victim she doesn't deserve it, that it's not her fault and that she isn't alone.

"No one ever does anything to earn it," Inman said.

Two main resources in Eugene for people affected by domestic violence are Womenspace and Sexual Assault Support Services, she said. Womenspace's 24-hour crisis line phone number is 485-6513. SASS also has a 24-hour crisis line at 485-6700.

Patrick said Womenspace tries to educate women on the cycles of violence: a fight happens, the abusive partner is loving and apologetic, then tension builds again until another fight explodes.

"We try to empower women to come up with their own options," she said. "We don't try to tell them what to do."

If a victim is in an emergency situation, Womenspace volunteers may suggest she come to the shelter to stay temporarily.

On campus, victims can also go to the ASUO Women's Center to find out about options, support and resources.

Both Womenspace and SASS are run largely by volunteers. Students who are interested in volunteering can call Womenspace at 485-8232 and SASS at 484-9791.

Womenspace sponsors anti-violence exhibit

■ **ABUSE:** Center will bring exhibits to EMU Oct. 22 and 23 to publicize Domestic Violence Awareness Month

October was declared Domestic Violence Awareness month by Congress in 1989 in the hope that raising awareness of abuse could help end domestic violence.

Volunteers, organizations and activists have planned several special events to address issues of domestic violence during this month.

Womenspace, a battered women's shelter and resource center, is sponsoring the Silent Witness and No Excuse for Abuse exhibits to educate the public on domestic violence.

The Silent Witness exhibit features 18 red, life-size silhouettes representing Oregon women killed by documented cases of domestic violence in one year. On 16 of the silhouettes are plaques with the documented details of the women's murders. The extra two Witnesses, one for an Oregon victim and one for a Lane County victim, were made because organizers wanted to acknowledge women killed by domestic violence whose deaths were not attributed to abuse.

The exhibit has already been on display this month at Lane Community College and the Junction City Public Library. Womenspace will bring the figures to the EMU Oct. 22-23.

The No Excuse for Abuse exhibit will be on display all month in the lobby of the Lane County Courthouse. Signs with the excuses abusers give for hitting their victims are hung on the wall of the courthouse, with accompanying posters dispelling myths about domestic abuse and explaining why there is no acceptable excuse for violence.

Share the Wealth, an organization working for economic equality, will present a workshop called "The Growing Divide" at the University on Oct. 18.

"The Growing Divide" will look at issues of economic barriers that can keep women from leaving abusive relationships or force them to return to violent situations because they can't make ends meet on their own.

Climber: Remains brought down by avalanche

records. "Both families are accepting the situation as it is," Miller said. "There is not a lot that anyone can do about it. They are ready to try to put it behind them and try to get on with life."

Allard and Casey, both University students, had been missing since last November when they failed to return from a hiking trip.

Searchers couldn't find the remains of the second missing hiker last Friday and have called off any further recovery efforts.

"This case has been officially closed," Miller said. "But if something else shows up we will have to go and investigate. If Allard's remains are found, we'll have to go and bring them down."

The remains were recovered at the 8,000-foot level of North Sister. Searchers said it appeared as though the climbers were roped together when they fell. Casey appeared to have dropped nearly 1,800 feet in the fall.

There was a harness and a rope around the body, Miller said. The rope, which could have gotten

hooked on a sharp piece of rock, was bluntly cut.

Searchers are uncertain where the climbers actually fell.

"They didn't fall all the way down," Miller said. "The remains were brought down by an avalanche. They were just uncovered a few weeks ago. We got really lucky because there was just a small window of time to find the remains."

Miller said Allard probably dropped into one of the many gulches in the area.
