Student gets deadly disease

■ ILLNESS: After one of its members came down with spinal meningitis, an entire sorority received antibiotics

A University woman was diagnosed Wednesday night with spinal meningitis, said Dr. Gerald Fleischli, director of the Student Health Center.

The health center administered antibiotics to the student's sorority yesterday, Fleischli said. However, there is not much danger of an outbreak, Fleischli said.

"I think that we've got it contained," he said. "It's under control."

The student's name and the name of her sorority were not released.

Meningitis causes an inflammation of the brain lining, Fleischli said. Untreated, the infection can

cause a coma, shock and death. It also has an "awesomely high" mortality rate without the right treatment, Fleischli said.

The infection is moderately contagious to close contacts, Fleischli said. These are people who have spent at least four hours with the victim over the last seven days. However, people who have

had little or no contact with the victim have very little chance of developing the disease.

Antibiotic treatment also dramatically reduces the chance of getting the disease, Fleischli said. Because of this, the sorority should be protected from the disease, he said.

The health center decided there was not enough of a threat to people in the woman's classes, Fleischli said. Because of this, only the sorority was treated with antibiotics.

The woman was admitted to a Portland hospital Wednesday in a coma and was listed in critical condition, Fleischli said. She had been in Portland for the weekend. It was unclear Thursday night whether her condition had been formally downgraded, although Fleischli said she was improving.

Students with questions or concerns should go to Area C of the health center, Fleischli said.

JSO celebrates culture with fall fair

Admission to the event will be free, but coupons will have to be purchased in order to participate in the activities. Six coupons will cost \$3, and each coupon will allow a person to participate in one activity. Coupons can be purchased at the EMU ticket booth.

"We are expecting to sell 250 coupons," Kurihara said. "I hope there will be that many people there."
