Annual flu immunizations are recommended for the following:

1. Healthy persons 65 years or older.
2. Persons with long-term heart or lung problems.
3. Persons with any of the following: kidney disease, cystic fibrosis, diabetes, anemia, severe asthma and conditions which compromise immune mechanism.

Influenza vaccine may be given to persons wishing to reduce their chances of catching the flu, persons who provide essential community services and students or others in schools or colleges.

Greek: System still an option for many

Lisa Hill, a junior at the University and a member of Chi Omega sorority, said with such a diverse campus, there are going to be more people willing to speak out loudly against Greeks.

Oregon State University campus is perceived as a more conservative school, Hill said, which could be why it has a higher percentage of students in the Greek system. Oregon State has maintained a 19 percent Greek membership over the years, said Clay Torset, coordinator for Greek Affairs at Oregon State.

Students in the University's Greek system expressed frustration over the stereotypes that shed negative light on their way of life.

Rafe Hanahan, a junior and member of the Kappa Sigma fraternity, said the negative stereotypes originally kept him from wanting to have anything to do with the Greek system.

"I had no intention of going Greek," he said. The friends he made when he was a freshman were all really against it. However, one of Hanahan's childhood friends was a Kappa Sigma member who got him interested.

"It turned out to be different than what I expected," Hanahan said.

Lee said the current University Greek system is much different than that of the 1950s and 1960s. When she looks at the old University yearbooks she said she sees, "a Greek system that was much more involved, with parades and floats."

Being named "king of this and queen of that" was important, Hudzikiewicz said. Greeks ran the school, from the student body to campus clubs, she said.

"It was a very different school: very secure, insular," Hudzikiewicz said. "We were really into what was happening on cam-

■ **1920:** In the 1920s the University was seen by many as a country club for those with money and a desire to have fun.

■ **1962-63:** Women were permitted to live off campus.

■ **1960'S:** Anti-establishment attitude swept campus. The Greek tradition came under heavy criticism.

pus."

Because the University and the sorority or fraternity were central to student life for so many students, getting into the "right" house was an important step, she said. The whole process of getting into a particular house was much more selective than it is today.

Hudzikiewicz said, "In those days it was almost ruthless and some got very hurt."

Hazing in the fraternities was also a huge problem during this time, she said.

Today, Hudzikiewicz said, the number of students looking for a place in the Greek system is more equal to what is available. Most students are able to find a house

that meets their needs.

Regardless of the changes in attitude across campus, the students who continue to show interest in the Greek system are looking for the same things students were looking for 40 years ago, said Shelley Sutherland, University Greek advisor. "Students are looking for a smaller, close group of friends and an opportunity to become a campus leader," she said.

Greek life officials said what was true in 1972 holds true today. The Greek system is not expected to play the dominant role it once enjoyed at the University but it will "continue to provide a viable, small group-living option for many University students."
