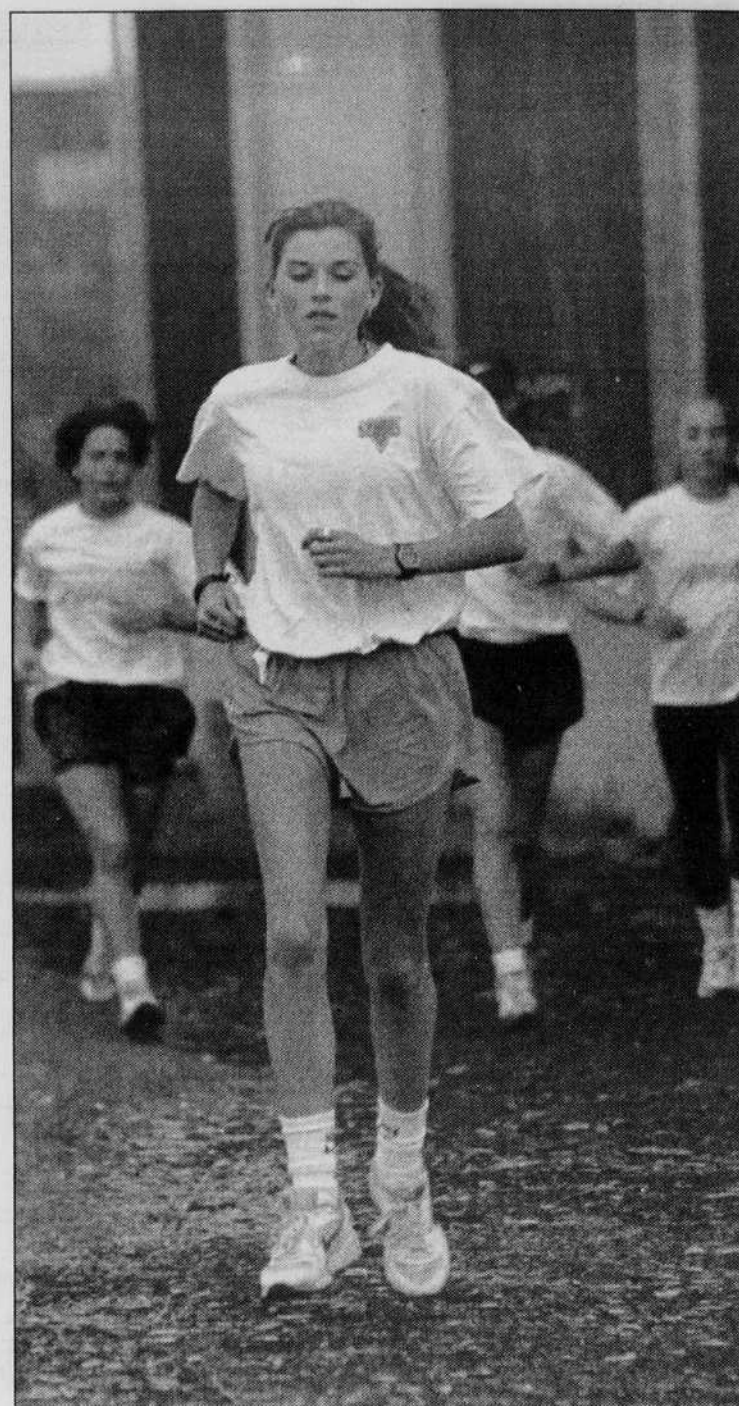

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other top-five runner in freshman Annie Ebner, who is out with a sore achilles tendon.

"Milena was going to be our top gun," women's coach Tom Heinonen said. "With Milena healthy, we would be one of the favorites to waltz in to the NCAA meet. Without her it's a whole lot tougher. She was going to be a top-10 NCAA athlete and maybe a contender for the national title. There is no team that can lose someone like that and cruise."

Davis could return for the District meet after a week-long layoff once the Pac-10 Championships are concluded, men's head coach Bill Dellinger said, but the Ducks are running confidently with the team that got them there.

"No one is going in there having any doubts just because one of our top guys is missing," senior Karl Keska said. "We realize that we have this great depth and that we can be competitive with any team."

"Without Matthew [Davis] I'm a little bit surprised that we're close," Dellinger said. "I know that we have eight really good runners. The fact that we are ranked fourth [in the nation] without him leads me to believe that we're a pretty good team."

Stanford will be the Oregon men's biggest challenge that they have faced so far this year. With Stanford being ranked second in the nation and Oregon fourth, there will be some Pac-10 pride at

stake as well as the title.

"I like the fact that they're ranked ahead of us nationally," Keska said. "I think that puts the pressure on them. We're not going to concede anything to them. We have a very competitive bunch of athletes, and we're going down there with the expectations that we're going to give them a really good run for their money."

Keska knows the course at Palo Alto well, with the ominously long hill toward the end of the course that leads into a long downhill to the finish. He passed four other runners in the last mile to take the individual title last year in that very section. Keska said that the course will be an advantage for the Ducks.

"I like the course," Keska said. "I like the hills. It's kind of a tough runners' course, and we have a tough team. A lot of runners get intimidated by those type of courses, but I think that the characters and personalities we have on our team drive us to that sort of course. I think it suits us."

The women will be running an uphill battle to try and defend their team title with the two top-five runners out. Marie Davis will be looked upon to lead the Ducks, but Oregon has gotten good help from runners that have shown improvement this year.

"I'm excited," Davis said, "I think that we have an opportunity to do really well. We're just getting better each meet, so hopefully everything will come together."
