EMU polystyrene ban questioned

■ **DEBATE:** Potential vendors suggest recyclable Styrofoam as a substitute for non-recyclable paper cups

The EMU banned it and so did the city of Portland.

It is considered "the mark of a disposable society" by Campus Recycling Manager Karyn Kaplan.

Yet polystyrene — a.k.a. food-grade Styrofoam — is now heralded by some restaurants and food service providers as recyclable and therefore ideal, said Brian Fuller, General Manager of BRING recycling, a local recycling resource. In addition, food vendors bidding on new EMU space are pushing for a revision in the vendor contract forbidding the use of Styrofoam in the EMU.

"We are truly striving for a balance between business and environmental issues," Jason Landau, president of local cafe Andrew Smash. "And we feel strongly against using non-recyclable paper cups."

The EMU is working to prioritize local businesses in the new EMU vendor space, but the companies must operate on the EMU terms specified in the vendor contract, including the Styrofoam policy, said EMU Director Dusty Miller. Vendor proposals have a set criteria where the EMU Board of Directors have ultimate negotiating say.

"I don't see any circumstances currently where the EMU Board would evaluate and accept the use

of Styrofoam," Miller said.

ASUO Environmental Coordinator Kit Mayer said he is concerned that if any company is able to "sneak by" the policy and use materials he calls environmentally unsound, there will be a general trend away from recycling.

"I'm concerned about the company overriding the existing policy by working to convince the [EMU] Board that Styrofoam is okay," Mayer said. "There needs to be a strong connection between potentially buried policies and new materials moving in."

University members involved in this debate agree that reusable mugs and containers are ideal for vendors. However, even with reusable mugs already common on campus, Kaplan is not satisfied with the amount of products being recycled.

"Styrofoam would just show the dichotomy between giving students reusable mugs and increasing cups and increasing the amount of all disposables," Kaplan said. "And the market for Styrofoam recycling is nearly extinct."

Fuller said the market for the food-grade polystyrene recycling is limited to three markets nationwide. BRING collects local polystyrene and ships it to a recycling plant in California.

"The market for polystyrene is decreasing — the pay is less and less for the truckloads we send South," Fuller said.

Kaplan also said the polystyrene recycling market is unstable, and that next to reusables, paper products are recycled at a higher rate. Landau doesn't share

this view and said he hopes more techniques for processing and recycling polystyrene will be developed.

"I look at a paper cup and know it's going nowhere except the landfill," Landau said. "And polystyrene is cheaper, and if we used other products, our staff would go way up because of the sanitation necessary."

In order to be recycled, food-grade polystyrene must be washed. Kaplan said this task is a dilemma should polystyrene be allowed on campus.

"Campus recycling doesn't want the burden of washing polystyrene," she said. "And huge debates about whether polystyrene is now 'okay' have concluded that blowing agents such as benzene used in the production are still eating the ozone, entering the water and recognized as cancer-causing agents."

Landau said his company will bid on a lease of the new EMU space and is thinking seriously about what choices the company will make, he said.

Miller agreed the Styrofoam ban is likely to be upheld.

"Some companies do use products we don't allow, and some say it's a challenge to change," Miller said. "But they know they don't have much choice if they want to operate in the EMU."

Kaplan also recognized the campus support in favor of the ban. The ASUO, the University Environmental Issues Committee and the Campus Recycling Program support the ban as it stands, Kaplan said.

Funds approved for computer specialist

The ASUO Student Senate convened Thursday night to approve a special request from the ASUO Executive. The Senate granted \$2,700 from the surplus fund to pay for a computer support specialist.

"There is no one out of the ASUO to service any ASUO [student] programs if they have troubles with their computers," ASUO Vice President Glen Banfield said.

A University student will be hired to fill the position, which

will pay \$6.75 an hour.

"It's a steal, a bargain at that rate," Banfield said.

Designated driver shuttle extends route

shuttle will be able to pick up intoxicated University students from fraternity houses, co-ops and private residences, said Ryan Osis, the shuttle's director.

"I saw alcohol as a problem on campus," he said. "I'd rather have [drunks] off the road."

The shuttle had agreed not to pick up people from non-licensed establishments to get a grant from Mothers Against Drunk Driving, Osis said.

However, the shuttle did not receive a MADD grant this year because it was funded by the Student Senate, he explained.
