"Like many minority groups, we face too many social and environmental problems that hinder us," Cha said.

Ashley Wang, APASU co-director, explained her own background as someone who immigrated to the United States at age 10.

"My mom never experienced any discrimination regarding her race and color, but I have, and a lot of my friends have," she said.

Leong said that groups like APASU can help fight that discrimination by providing a shelter for minority students.

"I think everybody needs a kind of family; a support group," he said.

The reception helps strengthen that group, according to Greer. "[The reception] is a bonding experience for new freshmen," he said.

Those new freshmen, along with people educated about APASU by the gathering, are important to staging the group's central event: a three-day conference in May that celebrates Asian Heritage Month, said Greer.

Fraternities run to raise research funds

A football will begin its journey from Eugene to Corvallis this Saturday.

The journey celebrates the 100-year Civil War football rivalry between the University and Oregon State University. It also adds fuel to the community's on-going battle against cancer, as proceeds from the journey will go to the American Cancer Society.

About 75 volunteers from University and OSU Kappa Sigma fraternity chapters will run about a mile each before handing off the ball to another runner.



Members from both chapters will meet up in Junction City en route to the ball's final destination, Parker Stadium.

"It benefits the American Cancer Society and gets people involved," said Ben Unger, philanthropy chairman for Kappa Sigma. "It's just some friendly competition between the two Kappa Sigma houses."

The Game Ball Run is modeled after a similar event that takes place in Washington during the Apple Cup game. The run has been going on since 1993 and continues to improve each year, Unger said.

"Every year we seem to be doing better, and we get more organized," he said. "It's definitely going to continue."

Flat donations have already been collected and will continue to be collected up until Nov. 23. In total Kappa Sigma members said they hope to raise \$10,000 to help the American Cancer Society research, educate and develop programs to fight against cancer.

"I think it's an excellent idea [that] they're getting involved with the community and raising money for such a worthy cause," said Jeanne Havercroft, local director of the American Cancer Society.

The run also helps to show the community the positive activities that the greek system does, Unger said.

"It shows mutual cooperation toward a very positive goal," said football head coach Mike Bellotti. "I think it's terrific — anything that can benefit in cancer research. Anything I can do to put my name of support to something such as this, I'm willing to do."

Forest ecologist will speak on new book

International forest ecologist and independent author Chris Maser will speak today at 4 p.m. in the EMU Ballroom, focusing on his new book, Sustainable Community Development.

Maser, the author of four books including Forest Primeval: The Natural History of an Ancient Forest and The Odyssey of Thomas Condon: Irish Immigrant, Frontier Missionary, Oregon Geologist, is a facilitator in resolving environmental disputes and fostering sustainable community.

The Corvallis resident has spent 20 years working as a research scientist in natural history and ecology in forest, shrub steppe, subarctic, desert and coastal settings. He has also worked in Egypt and Nepal as a research mammalogist.

In western Oregon, he studied old-growth forests while working



as a research ecologist with the Bureau of Land Management.

The free public lecture is part of the Oregon Humanities Center's 1996 Robert D. Clark Lecture in the Humanities.
