## Death: Case is still not resolved

he noted. "And Oregon physicians are better educated about this issue than in other states," he said. "That's because we have had a lot of discussion about this, and the issues have been thrashed out more in this state."

But James Bopp, the national right-to-life lawyer who's been leading the legal attack on Oregon's assisted suicide law, said Tuesday the legal battle is far from being resolved.

The constitutional questions surrounding Oregon's

law have already been argued before the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, which likely won't rule until the Supreme Court issues its decision in the New York and Washington laws this summer.

Bopp said no matter how the Supreme Court rules in that case, the opposing sides of Oregon's assisted suicide law probably will appeal their cases to the nation's highest court as well.

"It's reasonable to think that could take a year after the U.S. Supreme Court makes its decision" on the New York and Washington laws, Bopp said.

oring Oregon West memberships.

Former owner of Oregon West, Stephanie Harris, said Southside Athletic Club, Pacific Nautilus Gym and Aerobics, Downtown Athletic Club, Courtsports Athletic Club and the YMCA are also honoring former memberships by either offering student rates, lowering or eliminating initiation fees or giving free previews to their clubs.

"We've sent out letters to all of our members letting them know that they do have options," Harris said. "All the other clubs are pitching in and making this work."

Harris said she chose not to renegotiate the lease because she felt new owners would be more able to make Oregon West a bigger and better facility.

"What that club needed was someone with new energy to come in and make it grow," Harris said. "We brought it up from the low point that it was at three years ago, but we just started to get overwhelmed."

Contrary to what was reported in *The Register-Guard*, Harris said she never tried to

sell the business to Better Bodies owner Troy Finfrock. Instead, Harris said it was important for her to sell to owners who would keep the same feel of Oregon West after it changed hands. *The Register-Guard* was unable to contact Harris before they went to press, leading to the confusion.

Harris said she was disappointed with the changes the new owners are planning for the club. She said she was worried memberships to Better Bodies would not be as student friendly as past memberships with Oregon West had been.

Munyon said the Oregon West memberships are transferable, and in some cases students may be able to get an even lower monthly rate.

Morrow also said she hopes students will remember why they are getting a day off from classes for the observed holiday of King's birthday.

"It's nice to get off school, but I'm not sure that it serves its purpose, so I'm glad to see an event," Morrow said. "Design is communication, and my hope is that it will communicate and convince people to come to it."

The Coordinating Committee plans to use the poster to promote the schedule of campus events celebrating King's life. Committee members said a student poster is appropriate because this year's celebration focuses on civil rights issues facing University students, Parker said.

Issues such as hate crimes and unequal pay for graduates will be discussed during the event.

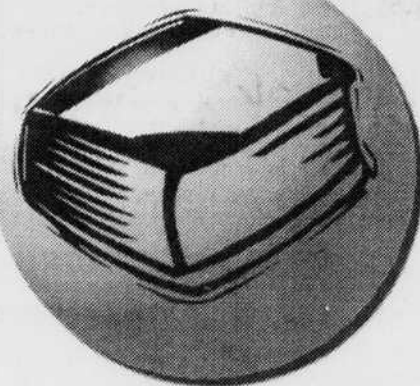
The other poster contest entries will be showcased in the EMU beginning on Monday. The celebration begins on Jan. 14 with a candlelight vigil and reading of King's speech.
