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Former law school dean honored

■ **SCOLES:** The probate specialist is given an award by the National College of Probate Judges

Fifteen years after his retirement, former law school dean Eugene Scoles is still active in the law field.

"He continues to be active as a scholar," Professor Leslie Harris said. Scoles' continual law involvement and expertise in the probate process has made him this year's recipient of the annual "Treat Award for Excellence" given by the National College of Probate Judges.

"I'm really very greatly honored," Scoles said of the award. "This is an award which recognizes the work you've done in bringing lawyers together." Scoles was notified of the award in August and received it in November at a ceremony in Monterey, Calif.

"It's a well-deserved award; no one is more deserved of this recognition," said Harris, who was one of the people who nominated Scoles for the award. The recipient of the award is nominated by judges, practicing lawyers and educators around the country.

The Treat award is granted to an individual who "has made a significant contribution to the improvement of the law of judicial administration in probate or relat-

ed fields."

Harris said Scoles has made that significant contribution.

"He's greatly respected and admired," she said. "He's one of the great leaders of American education."

The probate process, the handling of a deceased person's property, has become Scoles' expertise throughout the years. He has written books and articles, taught classes and worked with national organizations that dealt with the probate process.

Scoles first came to the University to serve as law school dean from 1968 to 1974. He then became a law professor until his retirement in 1982. After his retirement, Scoles became a distinguished professor emeritus.

Though he's retired, Scoles is still active with the University.

"I promote the University whenever I can," he said.

Since his retirement, Scoles has worked with senior law students, helping them with the probate process. He has also served at the National Conference of the Bar Exam dealing with ethics examinations.

And he still serves as a role model for the law faculty, Harris

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Scoles said he continues to work at the University for the sake of the students and the future of law.

"It's important to academia to work with practicing lawyers and judges for the importance of law," he said.

Currently, Scoles is a member of the joint editorial board of the probate code, which reviews probate reform movements.

Prior to his arrival at the University, Scoles served on the law school faculty at Stanford University, the University of Tokyo and the University of Khartoum, Sudan.

Scoles received his B.A. and J.D. degrees from the University of Iowa.

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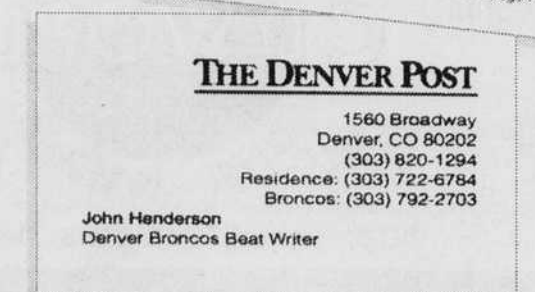
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
