Torrey pledges to focus on citizen concerns

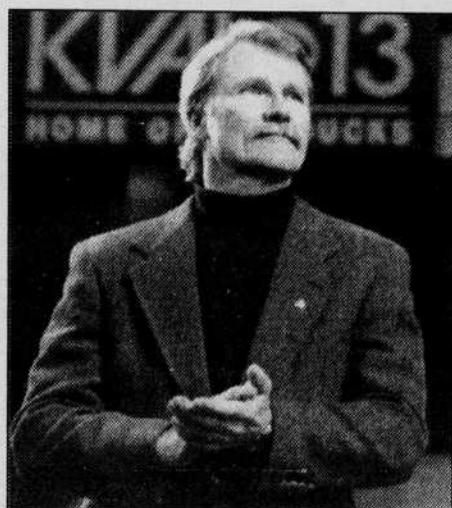

■ STATE-OF-THE-STATE: Bargaining on teachers' salaries proposed

SALEM — Gov. John Kitzhaber today proposed statewide bargaining on teacher salaries now that the state pays the bulk of local school expenses.

Kitzhaber made the proposal in his state-of-the-state address to the opening session of the 1997 Legislature.

Teacher pay now is negotiated in school districts around the state, although two property tax limits passed by voters have resulted in the state taking over most school

KITZHABER'S STATE-OF-THE-STATE-ADDRESS

- Urged lawmakers to set up a statewide salary schedule for teachers.
- Supported performance-based incentives for teachers and administrators.

Symantec gives anti-virus software gift to University

■ **DONATION:** The 350 licenses for Norton Anti-Virus should protect the computing center from infection

The Symantec Corporation of Eugene recently donated an estimated \$10,000 worth of anti-virus software to the University Computing Center. The software should stop countless numbers of students from receiving or transmitting computer viruses that could wipe out entire computer sys-

tems, said Hervey Allen, a microcomputer support specialist at the Computing Center.

The gift, which totals 350 licenses for Symantec's Norton Anti-Virus software, will help computing center employees detect and eliminate viruses from student disks and other sources.

"The Norton [software] does a much better job at nipping the problems in the bud than most programs do," Allen said.

"We have helped the University in other ways and felt that this gift would be particularly useful," said Jeri Stark, chairperson

of the Symantec giving program. "Symantec Eugene is very interested in being a positive contributor in the community and we felt that donations like this are important."

The previous Computing Center anti-virus protection contract expired last June and the costs for site licenses have increased to over \$10,000 a year. The Computing Center employees were in the process of finding a low-cost method to purchase software. "The gift couldn't have come at a better time," Allen said.
