They were led by Jordan Weiner's three goals and two assists. Malia dished out three assists for the Ducks, raising his point total on the trip to eight.

Normally, the Ducks would be ecstatic about winning two games on the road. However, this trip was a bit disappointing, not for the fact that they lost one game, but because of who they lost to.

"The loss against USC was really disappointing because it was a conference game," forward Robert

Wasson said. "Other than that, I'm happy with the trip. Winning two-out-of-three is pretty good."

The loss dropped the Ducks to 4-4-1 in the Pac-8 and hurt their chances of getting one of four spots in the league's postseason tournament.

With four league games remaining, however, they still find themselves in the thick of the race.

It will just be more difficult now, as the team essentially will be facing a must-win situation in each of its remaining games, starting with a pair of home games this weekend against league-leading Stanford.
