As for Wilkins, Montgomery has the luxury of having a pretty good point guard of his own — preseason All-American Brevin Knight.

Knight and Wilkins, both seniors, have been playing against each other for the past four years, developing quite a rivalry.

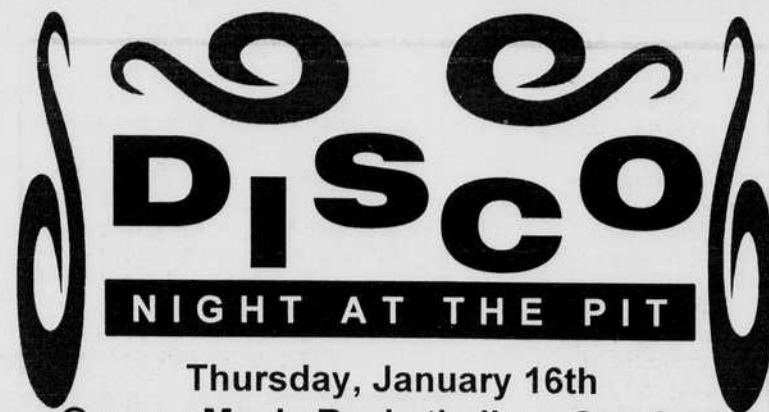
"You've got the two premier point guards in the conference," Montgomery claimed. "They are very similar in the way that they play, so it has always been inter-
