Harris: Waddell advises students on residency issues

Harris said California gave up jurisdiction on her spousal abuse case, and she is now receiving protection from Lane County. She said the state refused to notice these points in her appeal's latest 500-page submission to Waddell.

In Lane County Circuit Court in May 1995, Harris had reason to believe she had finally beat the system because she was awarded residency. But Harris' claim as a resident had another test to pass.

The state board later appealed the case to the Oregon Court of Appeals. The case was overturned on Dec. 24 because the Lane County Circuit Court had overstepped its authority by replacing Clark's judgment.

"I'm very unhappy about it," Harris said of the Court of Appeals ruling. "I think it was an unfair ruling."

THE GENDER ISSUE

Harris explained a case of a male who moved from out of state at the same time as she did and was given residency without a problem.

"They award residency very arbitrarily," Harris said.

She said it's a matter of gender and class, but Waddell sees it differently.

"I think her case wouldn't be any different than a man who is single and who has children," Waddell said.

Waddell can't remember a case similar to Harris' involving a single male parent.

By moving into the state with a spouse or partner, the issue of intent for educational purposes can shift from primary to secondary, Waddell said.

"Indirectly, these partners can have an effect," Waddell said.

An example of that situation would be a married couple moving to Oregon upon acceptance of a job or a transfer in job location. Waddell said that type of applicant most likely would be successful in proving the secondary intent was to attend school.

OTHER CASES

For another student, proving his case for residency was not as easy as he may have expected. After approximately three months and an appeal to the state board, Todd Sigaty won his case.

Sigaty, a graduate student, left the state in 1993 after moving to Oregon in 1991 and being granted residency in 1992.

He continued to own a home in Eugene and rented it out to friends while he spent a year in Alaska and two years out of the country.

"I didn't do anything in any other state," Sigaty said.

He kept his Oregon driver's license, voter's registration, checking account and possessions in his house during his three-year absence.

The state places actual physical time spent in the state as high priority for residency consideration, Sigaty said.

"I think we have freedoms and rights to pursue even vacations and even work that go beyond where we decide our residency," he said.

Sigaty moved back to Oregon before being accepted into graduate school. Further proof toward his intent to stay was his registration for the state bar exam.

But all of this was not enough to convince Waddell that Sigaty should be considered a resident.

However, after Waddell denied Sigaty's affidavit, the state board reversed Waddell's decision.

Sigaty said he is confident he would have won had the appeal gone all the way to court.

Had Sigaty remained a non-resident through all of this, he said he would have postponed graduate school.

"It shows you can actually be gone from the state for a very long time and still be a resident," Sigaty said.

Waddell said he meets with students and advises them on ways they can gain residency. "That's why the percentages of approval are fairly high," he said.

Establishing a domicile and attending school part time are ways students can work toward residency.
