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Oregon heads north to take on UW

■ **HOCKEY:** The Ducks play their final two league games on the road, hoping to nail down a playoff spot

Looking to rebound from a tough loss to Stanford last Saturday, the Oregon Club hockey team travels to Seattle this weekend for a pair of Pacific-8 hockey league games against Washington.

Oregon is 12-5-1 overall and 5-5-1 in the Pac-8 after splitting the weekend series with the Cardinal. The Ducks won 6-3 Friday but lost 4-3 Saturday when the Cardinal scored with just more than a minute remaining in the game to break a 3-3 tie.

That kind of a loss is often demoralizing to a team, but head coach Nick Ham isn't concerned

that it will affect his club this weekend.

"It's always tough to lose, and probably even more so when it's in the last minute of the game," he said. "The guys were counting on that win and they were working hard, so they took it kind of tough, but they weren't down on themselves. It was just a tough loss."

The Ducks and Huskies are somewhat familiar with each other, having played twice back in October. Both games were close, with the Ducks prevailing 5-3 in the first game and 6-5 in the second.

"[The Huskies are] big guys," Ham said. "They like to hit, but they're a little slow. We can take advantage [of them] with our speed."

The games against the Huskies are the final Pac-8 games of the season for the Ducks, who aren't

sure of their playoff fate yet. But they know these games are crucial in deciding whether or not they make it.

"The [Washington] games are important," Ham said. "Because of the loss against Stanford, we need to pick up both of these wins."

The playoff race in the Pac-8 is difficult to figure out because teams don't play the same number of games.

Robert Wasson, assistant captain for the Ducks, said he believes Oregon is among five teams still alive in the post-season race, including Stanford, California, Southern Cal and Washington State.

The top three teams in the league plus the host team, which this year is Southern California, advance to the Pac-8 tournament to be played Feb. 21-23.

Clinton says Rodman's kick was wrong

■ **KICK:** The President says Rodman would be a better role model if he admitted wrongdoing

NEW YORK — President Clinton says he's "a big Dennis Rodman fan" but the Chicago Bulls star should admit what he did was wrong.

Clinton said he worries when famous athletes act destructively, as Dennis Rodman did when kicking a cameraman, because so many young people admire them.

"There are an awful lot of young people out there, particularly your boys and young men, who don't have immediate positive male role models who can contradict a lapse by an athlete," Clinton told New York's WBIS-TV in an interview broadcast Thursday.

"I'm sure in his heart of hearts he regrets doing that," the president added.

If Rodman admitted wrongdoing, it would send a good message to young people, Clinton said.

Rodman in an interview on ABC's "Primetime Live" Wednesday said his kick was only a "tap." The Chicago Bulls forward said the kick landed on the cameraman's leg, not the groin as the injured man claimed.

"I apologized," said Rodman, who agreed to pay cameraman Eugene Amos \$200,000. "But most people in the world would say he's acting."

No charges have been filed against Rodman, who was suspended by the NBA for 11 games without pay and ordered to undergo counseling. He then must meet with commissioner David Stern after the Feb. 9 All-Star game and convince him he should be reinstated.

The NBA also fined Rodman \$25,000. The suspension is the second-longest in NBA history and will cost Rodman more than \$1.1 million in lost pay.

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
