market.

The University and the school district are working together by linking University resources and students through several different programs.

Resources donated to the school districts include the award-winning computer network which every school district in Lane County is allowed to use, and a special program, Duck Link, which allows high school students to take University courses at reduced rates.

Other services donated include:

- The University donates money to schools for field trips to the University Natural History Museum.

- ESCAPE gives University students the opportunity to help teachers in the classroom.

- The foreign language departments of the University are helping the school district develop a curriculum for non-native speaking students.

- University students help with handicapped school children in the school district, and University athletes donate time to young

athletes.

Both speakers said they agreed on the future of educational funding because of poor wording in Measure 47.

"We are going in the wrong direction with \$35 million less being invested in education than in 1990," Frohnmayer said.

Private donations of \$330,000 were given to the school district to help compensate for the \$10 million lost through Measure 5, Nichols said. If another \$10 million is cut from the school districts budget through Measure 47, it may force school closures.

Consequences of Measure 47 could be more cutbacks to low priority services such as education. Both Frohnmayer and Nichols voiced their concern that Measure 47 will probably raise college tuition.

Another tuition hike will increase the financial burden of University students, half of whom are already on some sort of financial aid. They also expressed concern that another tuition rise will affect students. The average student loan debt after graduation is

sary because he sensed the public's frustration in getting in touch with city officials. Instead of just talking with them on the phone, Torrey said people can now get five minutes to talk with him about whatever they wish.

"There's a big difference in my opinion in talking to people on the phone and looking them right in the eye," Torrey said.
