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Vigil: Groups seek community input

concerns of the possible health impacts on residents because of the Hyundai plant, along with the property-tax subsidy given to Hyundai to encourage their development in Eugene.

Immerman said he believed the Hyundai plant received a tax break of \$44.7 million, which would amount to every person in Eugene contributing \$355.

Hyundai spokesperson Dan Steinberg said he hadn't heard this specific figure before, but in the long run Eugene will see a substantial gain in property tax revenue. The tax break gives the company three years of not paying property taxes.

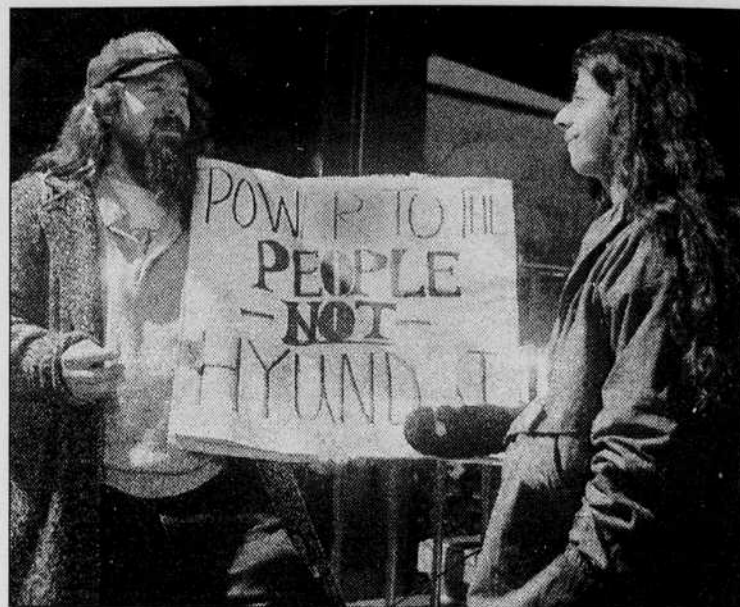
"In addition, Hyundai has already paid \$90 million in permits for construction," Steinberg said.

Immerman's main message was that citizens are losing control of important decisions that will affect them and the community.

"We have to sit at city council meetings. We have to do more than just write letters to the editor. We have to network," Immerman said. "What's at stake is our health; what's at stake is our babies and what's at stake is our neighbors."

City Council President Laurie Swanson-Gribskov said in the actual case of Hyundai, the council was bound by the Willow Creek Plan, which gave authorization to a light-industrial park in West Eugene.

"We held public meetings for informational purposes, but there weren't any decisions we could make because of input," Swanson-Gribskov said. She said citizen input in the 1980s was inherent in constructing this development plan; however, the present council is looking at revising enterprise

zones and tax subsidies from the city's 1995 growth management study. "Now is the time that citizens' involvement is encouraged," Swanson-Gribskov said.

The vigil was sponsored by the Eugene Pacific/Green party. Pam Driscoll, a volunteer for the party, said the vigil was held at City Hall because it is the place where decisions about future development will occur. She said the purpose of the vigil was also to keep citizens aware of Hyundai.

"[Hyundai] doesn't want to be in the limelight," Driscoll said. "They want us to forget about them."

The Pacific/Green Party, which has about 500 members in Lane County, was joined by members of Citizens for Public Accountability, who sponsored the November 1996 Toxics-Right-To-Know ini-

tiative, Earth First! members and University students affiliated with the Survival Center.

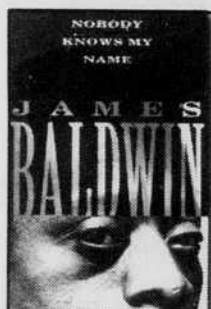
Berend Diderich, a sophomore environmental studies major with the Survival Center, said he was concerned with the lack of community input on the project.

"I see the planning stages for this Hyundai plant never including any of my input," Diderich said. "And I'm going to be directly affected."

Steinberg said he thought the protest was just an attempt to derail the project through public opinion.

"A candlelight vigil is just a way to gain access to the media to further their cause," he said.

Steinberg said the first phase of the project is nearing completion and the plant should begin producing by the fall.

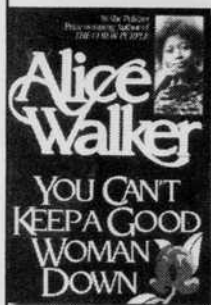
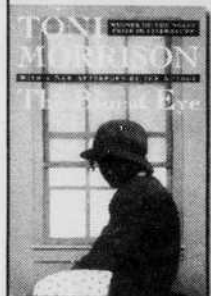
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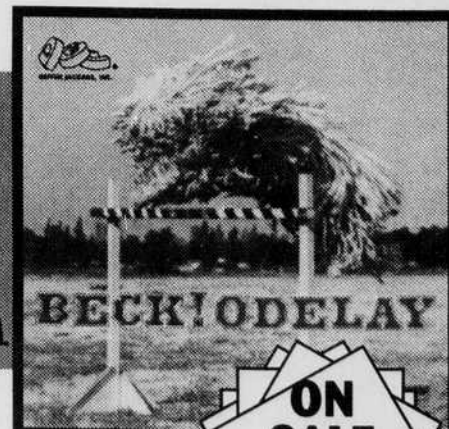
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
