Coastal Lakes—March 7-9

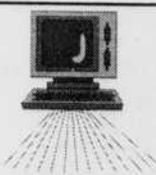

Services: Eugene's Aquatic program could suffer cuts

bert Amphitheater and Eugene Aquatics. These services were suggested as ones that should take high-impact funding reductions.

By eliminating funding for the Hult Center and Cuthbert, the city would save about \$1.629 million. By closing Amazon Pool and Echo Hollow Pool of Eugene's Aquatic program, the city would gain about \$448,000. High-impact reductions amounted to about \$3.15 million.

"I am still depressed," Swanson Gribkov said. "... What we are doing to the community, my children will inherit. But I know I have a leadership responsibility to [make

cuts], and I'm trying to be the best steward as possible."

Inherent to the city's "core" service plan was the notion that Monday night's proposed cuts were not decisions, but just a way for councilors to get a sense of what important services the council should maintain or reduce.

Tony Mounts, service improvement director for the city of Eugene, emphasized the fact that no city service is off limits to funding cuts. In addition, it was suggested that private companies, non-profit agencies or other support services could better handle some services.

During the workshop, students work on all aspects of producing a newspaper, including photography, reporting and designing, Russial said.

Professionals from local newspapers act as mentors for the students and meet with them in the

afternoons, he said.

Workshop participants live in the dorms on campus and spend the week covering local campus stories. Some news situations are also created for students to cover.

"Last year we had Jody Runge from the women's basketball team come in and do like a press conference," Russial said. "We give them a situation and have them learn what it takes to report on it."

Election plan rejected

The Constitutional Court rejected the ASUO Elections Board's proposal to change election regulations for this year's elections at a public hearing on Friday. Proposed changes would have made it necessary for students wishing to run for an ASUO Executive position to collect 400 signatures to be placed on the ballot, and those running for a Student Senate seat would have had to collect 50.
