Women: Thompson tough to defend

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game and is tied with Stanford's Kate Starbird as the conference's leading scorer at 22.3 points per game.

"Tina Thompson is one of the best players in the Pac-10, maybe an All-American this year," Oregon's Arianne Boyer said.

What makes Thompson so difficult to defend is her ability to play anywhere on the floor, Oregon head coach Jody Runge said. While she is currently averaging double-figures in rebounds, establishing herself as a force in the paint, the 6-foot-3 Thompson can also play on the perimeter.

She is leading her team with 34 three-pointers in 1997, including three games in which she made

three triples.

"I think that is what has helped me with my game is being versatile," Thompson said. "If I am being [double-teamed] and people are taking away my post play, then I'll play out on the wing."

If she can play inside and outside, does Thompson have a weakness?

She would be the last one to tell. "I am not going to say I have a weakness, but I think that I do pretty good at a lot of things," she said.

"She's real tough," Runge said. "She's so talented athletically and a such tough defensive draw because she can shoot [from the outside], or she'll power it up inside."

While the accolades and statis-

tics are nice, Thompson said those are not important — her junior season showed her that. But what is important to her is winning, which includes a strong showing in the tournament.

"I don't think anyone is satisfied with just a trip to the tournament," she said. "When you get there you want to win as many games as you can. I think the goal for everyone is to get to the Final Four."

And she knows tournament time is called March Madness for a reason.

"Any team at any time can go anywhere — and we expect to go far."

Success like that would be nothing new for Thompson.
