PFC nears end of budget season

The ASUO Programs Finance Committee allocated increases in four ASUO programs' budgets at a meeting on Tuesday. The Department of Education Policy and Management/Graduate Student Organization (DEPM/GSO) received an allocation of \$480, a 26 percent increase. The organization represents graduate students in departmental and college meetings, hold colloquium for GTFs to discuss activities. The group's leadership changes every year, and the name is changing to the Department of Education, Leadership, Technology and Administration (DELTA). The organization is planning to change from postage to e-mail to save money.

The Women's Law Forum received \$4,413. The forum is a mostly educational group to outreach, provide research to women, provide a support network for

women at the law school. The group works closely with the Women's Center.

The Vietnamese Student Association received an allocation of \$4,022. The association is a large group including APASU members that holds an orientation each fall and a cultural show in Winter and is cosponsored by several campus groups.

The International Law Students Association requested a 406 percent increase because they are just beginning to get their group together and would like to improve and maintain it. The group holds an International Law Conference and participates in the Jessup Moot Court competition. The association

was allocated \$1,190, a 56 percent increase.

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houses, said MCC Program Advocate Dee Eason. She stated that office hours, student group meetings, panel discussions, workshops and speakers are some of the primary reasons for the MCC's proposal to expand to the Footnotes space. In addition, she said phone lines, computers and desks in that space could be given to the multicultural groups presently on the waiting list for EMU space.

Expansion of the MCC was endorsed in a memo from Vice-President of Administration Dan Williams to EMU Board Chair Kim Guevara, emphasizing "the need for more space to accommodate the programmatic requirements of the MCC."

The LGBTA asked for the Footnotes space in order to have the group feel more included as a student union. Emphasis was placed on the LGBTA's desire

to have a center rather than a programming space like the MCC requested. Concern was also voiced that wherever the LGBTA is located in the EMU, there is a need for both office and private space, and group representatives said the Footnotes space would be ideal. "A pill box is not enough — we need office and safe space," said LGBTA Office Manager Karen Vittek.

Representatives from the JSU and the BWA voiced the need for individual offices, and consented to being placed in the multicultural wing.

In response to input from various student groups, EMU board members presented four different proposals concerning space allocation, and the board voted to implement the fourth proposal after hearing deliberation and arguments for and against proposed space for the various groups in the EMU.
