

Women: Seniors have yet to win at OSU

17-point victory over then-second-place Southern California.

Oregon sits alone in second place in the Pac-10 at the moment with a 13-4 record and is destined for its fourth straight trip to the NCAA Tournament.

Oregon State, on the other hand, is on a four-game losing streak, and has lost two straight at home to UCLA and USC. The Beavers are now in seventh place in the Pac-10 at 5-12 and will not make the tournament for the first time in four seasons.

"I don't think I see [tonight's game] as dangerous," Runge said. "I think the fact that we got a little bit of a wake against UCLA will help us not stumble at [Oregon State]."

A "stumble" against Oregon State would be costly for Oregon, but it would not take the Ducks out of the NCAA Tournament pic-

ture. However, it would certainly hinder their chances of hosting the first two rounds of the tournament.

With its sweep of the Los Angeles schools, the Ducks moved up to No. 22 in the power ratings (from No. 25), but remain on the outside of The Associated Press top 25.

Runge said she hopes the NCAA selection committee looks at the Ducks' performance down the stretch when deciding the top 16 bids in the tournament.

"All I can hope is that they look at the last 10 games and how well we played, especially against Stanford and beating USC and not stumbling."

While the Ducks will be worried about tripping on their road to the tournament, Oregon State could be thinking about getting revenge for last season's season-ending 69-60 upset at the hands of the Ducks.

"We beat them the last game of the season to get into the tournament, I think that is great motivation for them," Runge said.

If the Beavers are to return the favor with an upset of the Ducks tonight, center Tina Lelas will have to step up for the Beavers.

The senior leads the Beavers in both scoring and rebounding this season with 15.2 points and 9.2 boards per game. And it was Lelas that kept the Beavers anywhere near the Ducks earlier this season at McArthur Court.

She had 16 points and 17 rebounds in the Beavers' 77-59 loss to the Ducks in both teams' conference opener.

For the Ducks, Boyer continues to lead the team in scoring and rebounding. The senior is averaging 14.8 points and 8.7 rebounds per game, and this week she was recognized as the Pac-10 Player of the Week for the second time this year.

Football: Manning holds several school records in passing

"The rascal knows how to keep a secret," he said.

Manning did not have to declare his intention to enter the April 19 draft on Jan. 10, the deadline for most undergraduates, because he is scheduled to graduate this spring.

Manning holds Tennessee records for career passing yardage (7,382), touchdowns (53), completions (576), attempts (904), completion percentage (63.7) and numerous single-season marks.

He has been mum about his plans since the Vols' 48-28 vic-

tory over Northwestern in the Citrus Bowl on New Year's Day.

Archie said he provided his son with a package of information to study on agents and salary caps.

Only one other college quarterback, Jim Druckenmiller of Virginia Tech, is considered a first-round prospect. Danny Wuerffel, the Heisman Trophy winner from Florida, is projected at this point to go around the fourth or fifth round.

Investigation: Bettors laid out \$250,000 on 'a hunch'

Gaming and Control Board's chief of enforcement in 1994, said Tuesday that "there's no cloud hanging over ASU as far as we are concerned."

Asher said two of the bettors were from Phoenix and the other was from New Jersey. They bet big — \$250,000 — simply because "we had a hunch, a tip that this was the time," Asher said.

The Las Vegas Review-Journal quoted sources as saying the Nevada board's investigation extended to three previous games that season in which Arizona State had been favored but lost.

Arizona State officials said the last they had heard about the case was in 1994, when rumors circulated about the unusual betting. The Pac-10 Conference released a statement on March 7, 1994, saying the Nevada board told conference officials no Arizona State players or officials were under investigation.

"A representative of the board indicated it had no reason to believe there was any involvement of any ASU player or representa-

tion," the Pac-10 statement read. "Its focus will be on the bettors and the pattern and amounts of their wagers."

The initial investigation centered on a March 3, 1994, game in which Arizona State hosted Washington State. The Devils were favored by three points, but lost by nine.

Two days later, Arizona State was an 11-point favorite against Washington, but the spread dropped as low as four points. Arizona State came back from an early deficit to win 73-55.

Washington State spokesman Rod Commons said Tuesday that athletic department officials were not previously aware of the allegations. He declined further comment.

Jim Daves, a spokesman for the Washington sports department, said Tuesday night that the school had not been notified of new developments in the investigation.

Roxy Roxborough, an independent oddsmaker, said the Nevada board was aware at the time "that the people who were betting were not Vegas regulars."

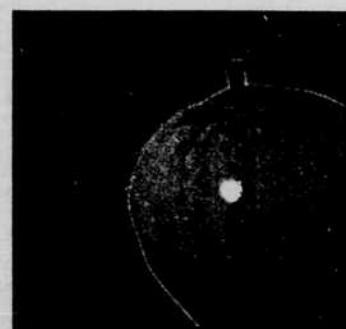
