Park. In 1988, plans for the research park were approved, calling for 15 buildings and 1.2 million square feet of development to come within 35 feet of the river. So far, the city has constructed an underpass, a paved road and an enlarged pedestrian path leading to the Autzen footbridge.

Although in a May 30, 1996 *Emerald* article, Diane Wiley, a planning associate at the University Planning Office, said she believed the research park will benefit the reputation of the University as a re-

search establishment as well as potentially offer job opportunities to University graduates, some members of the University community are opposed to the construction.

Julia Fox, a University sociology instructor, and Ann Hagemann, a University research associate in molecular biology, both have filed as co-chief petitioners of the initiative. In a March 14 protest of the underpass and road construction, both women, along with about 70 protesters, took a pledge to boycott the underpass until it is filled back in.

40-acre former youth camp near Mountainair, N.M., in June 1995, according to an official of the insurance company that sold the property. The cult apparently lived there until about eight months ago.

He was the son of the former chairman and chief executive officer of South New England Telephone Co.

Strom, 44, had planned on a career in botany. She was the daughter of U.S. District Judge Lyle Strom of Omaha, Neb.

school, Marian High School in Omaha, in 1971, and then attended Oregon State.

“I thought sure it would be short-lived and she would be

back home,” Lyle Strom said Saturday. “I have no answers. It does not seem consistent with her character and personality.”

Strom last saw his daughter in 1987. He said he never thought about deprogramming or kidnapping her.

She was happy, she wasn't being abused and she wasn't being held against her will, he said.

“She really felt she had found the right thing, and she really thought she was doing what she should be doing,” Strom said.
