Senate approves computer loan

■ **DECISION:** The Senate approves the request for the loan of five computers from the computer technical support committee

The Student Senate met Wednesday to confirm the members of the ASUO Elections Board, discuss special requests from the International Students Association and MEChA, review a ballot measure from Robert Wasson on behalf of Club Sports and approve the Athletic Department Finance Committee's final budget for the coming school year.

After the Elections Board was unanimously confirmed by the Senate, it requested the loan of five computers from the computer technical support committee. The computers, which will go to student groups in the future, will be loaned to the elections board for a two week period and will be distributed Friday with the understanding that the elections board will purchase theft and accident insurance for the computers, the Senate decided.

The International Students Association approached the Senate with a special request for funding for a Spring International Festival that will include International Night and will take place during International Week. ISA requested \$1,300 to cover the costs of various expenses that will arise during

the planning and execution of the week-long celebration.

After some debate as to whether the request was for fund raising or a combination of a fund raising and cultural event, the Senate approved the International Student Associations request for \$1,300.

MEChA approached the senate for a special request of \$1,012 to pay for airfare, hotel, registration and transportation expenses for 17 students to attend the MEChA National Conference in Lansing, Mich. this month.

MEChA raised money for the conference by approaching various student groups and University organizations. There was some debate about past funding for student groups which attend conferences. Some Senate members said they wished to maintain some sort of consistency in the funding for student conferences. A motion to make the request a loan failed and MEChA's request was approved as requested at \$1,012.

The Athletic Department Finance Committee's budget was approved as presented. The department lost approximately 385 student basketball seats at McArthur Court this year during negotiations, but gained 408 student seats at Autzen stadium for football games.

Robert Wasson from Club Sports asked for approval to go to this year's ballot with an initiative for a \$20,000 boost in funding. The motion was passed.

Stadium: Bicycle parking will be increased

This reduction leaves 4,749 minimum spaces required for Autzen Stadium.

After development, the University foresees available parking spaces to be at capacity with 4,768 vehicles. This includes extra space for larger vehicles such as RVs.

However, the study also notes at two major games with the highest parking count in the past two football seasons, the number of cars parked was below estimated capacity.

Campus planners say this is because fewer people need to park on-site and instead use alternate modes of transportation such as walking or riding a bike.

The study also states: "The parking areas around and adjacent to the stadium are currently unmarked, so there is no accurate assessment of the existing parking supply."

The only "accurate" study done to-date on parking at Autzen Stadium

was taken from an aerial photo to count of parking at the 1988 Oregon-Washington football game. In this study, only "about 750 vehicles were counted" in the proposed area of development.

Besides the loss of the west parking lot, the former curved parking layout will be changed to a straight parking format to allow more parking in the smaller area.

There will also be people telling fans where to park, a service that was implemented last season in order to increase the efficiency of parking.

"We won't be doing parking any different than we did last year," Walton said.

The only thing different will be the new athletic facilities sitting where a large expanse of graveled parking once was.

The opportunities and improvements that come with the new facilities outweigh the sacrifice of parking space, said Jan Oliver, assistant vice president for institutional affairs.

But convincing the city the loss

of parking space at the stadium will still fall above code requirements for a large development has been a long haul for the University.

"We've been working on it for the last six months. It's a unique situation that requires lots of consideration," Ramey said. "We have to meet code requirements just like any other citizen in Eugene."

As far as alternate modes of transportation go, the bicycle parking for games will also be enlarged.

"We'll have more secured parking for games just east of the main driveway," Walton said.

Riding the bus will also be encouraged and advertised to the community, but the basic answer to the parking question University officials give is: Don't drive to the game.

"Parking is always going to be a problem here," Walton said. "It's not easy to park anywhere in this city."

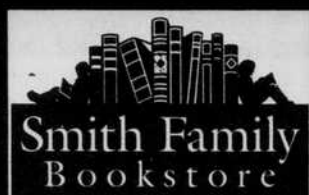
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
