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Women golfers tough in Tempe

■ **GOLF:** Women notch another top-five finish; men play today in California

The Oregon women's golf team, led by Paula Patterson, finished in fourth place in a field of nationally ranked competitors Sunday at the Ping/ASU Invitational in Tempe, Ariz.

Patterson played with the leaders the entire way, finishing the first round in third place and moving up to second place after two rounds, but she fell back to finish fourth for the tournament. Patterson, No. 29 in the nation, shot a six-over par 222 with rounds of 72, 74 and 76 on the par-72 course to finish 11 shots behind the winner.

Anika Heuser played well for the Ducks, opening with a 73 before falling back with dual rounds of 77 to finish tied for 16th overall. Heuser was as high as eighth place in the second round.

Teammates Karen Bristow and Kylie Wilson both showed strong performances for the Ducks, finishing tied for 27th place, each scoring a 230. Bristow carded rounds of 77, 75 and 78, while Wilson put up rounds of 75, 78 and 77. Tara Keller, the final Duck on the scoring card, finished in a tie for 42nd with two rounds of 80 before finishing strong with a final-round 74 for a total of 234.

Oregon's Pam Sowden, playing unattached to the Ducks, outplayed three of her teammates with rounds of 74, 77 and 78 for a 229 finish and a tie for 27th.

Second-ranked Arizona took the team title with three golfers in the top 10. The Wildcats shot an 880, 12 shots ahead of the host team, No. 3 Arizona State.

Twelfth-ranked UCLA finished in third place with a 902, three shots ahead of Oregon.

Arizona's Marisa Baene, the No. 1 individual in the country, took the medalist honors with a five-under par 211, which included an opening round of 67.

The Ducks will continue competition next Saturday and Sunday in Palo Alto, Calif., at the Stanford Intercollegiate, the last meet scheduled before the Pacific-10 Conference Championships.



On the men's side, the Ducks will be in action today and Tuesday as they travel to Westlake Village, Calif., for the Southwestern Collegiate.

Oregon, No. 34 in the latest poll, will play 36 holes on the first day of competition and finish up with 18 holes on the par-71 North Ranch Country Club course.

The field of 12 teams includes host USC, No. 5 in the nation, along with other nationally ranked competitors New Mexico (No. 7), Arizona State (No. 9), Brigham Young (No. 19), Pepperdine (No. 22) and Pac-10 foes California, UCLA and Oregon State.

Arizona State will also bring top-rated golfer Chris Hanell, who has four top-five finishes this year, to the tournament.

Expected to compete for the Ducks this week are Jeff Barney, J. J. Astorquia, Chris Cone, Ben Crane and Derek Croskrey. The squad will be looking to make its 10th top-10 finish of the year.

The men have only two more tournaments to gear up for the Pac-10 Championships, which start April 28 at the Eugene Country Club.

In addition to scoring in the 200, Mortimore won the long jump with a season-best leap of 24 feet, 9 1/4 inches. On his last attempt, Mortimore passed Washington State's Hilary Mawindi for the win.

"Hilary was jumping well and had three past 24 feet, so I really needed a good one," Mortimore said. "I tried to really get pumped up before the last jump and gave it my all."

Nelson won the high jump with a mark of 7-0 1/2 while setting a season best in the triple jump by more than two feet. The senior soared 49-8 1/2 to take second.

Oregon's Daniel Das Neves led the Ducks in the distance races, which featured Washington State's Kenya-filled lineup.

The senior cruised to an easy victory in the steeplechase with a time of 9 minutes, 28.2 seconds while teammate Rob Aubrey came in second with a time of 9:15.42.

In the 5,000-meter run, Oregon's Oliver Wirz, Micah Davis and Chris Graham finished second, third and fourth, respectively.

Other Oregon winners included sophomore Piotr BuciarSKI with a height of 17-0 3/4 in the pole vault and senior Quincy Ruf-

fin, who set a season-best time of 14.89 in the 110-meter hurdles.

Ruffin led Oregon's hurdlers, who also received a third- and fourth-place finish in the 110-meter hurdles from Will Driessen and Paul Pappas and second- and third-place finishes by Driessen and Robin Kiyonaga in the 400-meter hurdles.

Howard Moore's second-place finish with a time of 47.88 in the 400-meter dash paced Oregon's sprinters, while three Ducks finished second in throwing events.

Next up for the Ducks is the Oregon Invitational, which they host Saturday at Hayward Field.

3,000 went OK too, although it was a conservative race, and we didn't start breaking the pack until the last two laps. I felt really confident today and was happy to run races well and not die."

Kaarin Knudson earned a win in the 800-meter run with a time of 2:09.06

The throwing events were a bright spot for the Ducks as javelin throwers Karis Howell and Katie Pearmine combined for a 1-2 finish and NCAA provisional qualifying marks. Howell's throw of 160 feet, 8 inches was her fourth consecutive personal best.

"It was a big PR again, but my second was also in the upper 158-foot range so that was great," Howell said. "I still have more room to improve."

"When we watch the tapes, I see I'm not taking

advantage of all of my power. The main thing for me is to stay consistent in my technique and keep improving."

Oregon's Chris Cvitanich and Heidi Fisk claimed victories in the shot put and discus respectively.

Sue Morris became a Pac-10 qualifier in the 400-meter after turning in a personal best of 55.15.

Duck heptathlete Tish Henes won the 400-meter hurdles in 1:00.51, but struggled in the 100-meter hurdles with a sixth-place finish. Oregon's other multi-event performer, Jennifer Thomas, won the long jump with a leap of 18-7 and finished third in both the triple jump and 100-meter hurdles.

The Oregon 4x400-meter relay team of Aisha Wallace, Henes, Knudson and Morris beat Washington State by nearly nine seconds with a time of 3:45.03.

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
