"I know and respect all three," he said. "They've got to do what is best for the University of Oregon and I've got to do what it best for Mark Turgeon."

Green indicated that if Turgeon doesn't get the Oregon job, there may be an opening on his Tennessee staff.

"I'm anticipating that Mark Turgeon will be the head coach here. If he's not, then I've got to go and re-examine that," he said.

While Turgeon is 32-years-old, Green doesn't see his age as a problem. The only problem Green can foresee is Turgeon's lack of head coaching experi-

ence.

"The only thing wrong with Mark Turgeon is that he has an 0-0 record," he said. "Somebody would have to say I'm going to take a chance on this young man, I'm going to give him chance."

Green compared Turgeon's situation to his close friend Roy Williams, who has become a successful head coach at Kansas, his first head coaching job after working as an assistant at North Carolina.

"There was one athletic director in the world that was ready to take a chance and gamble on Roy Williams. That chance and gamble has paid off," he said.

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known for producing a large number of NBA-caliber basketball players, Green said. Oregon has to recruit outside of the state many times for the best players.

He said the job at Oregon is difficult because the program doesn't have the tradition of some other programs.

"You're going to have to go into those places, and you're going to have to create miracles just because of where you're located just to break even," he said of the schools located in the Pacific Northwest.

Green said his new \$550,000 per year contract was a factor in his decision to take the job, but also the opportunity to reach the Final Four played a big part in the decision.

"I think it's a little bit of both," he said. "I think athletics now, money is important to the people not only who play the game, but who coach the game."

Green said he would welcome the Ducks to play a game at Knoxville in the future and Tennessee would be willing to face Oregon at a game to be played in Portland.

Also winning medals for the Ducks were Gabriel Burgess, who finished third in the Red/Brown division, and Stephanie Greer, who won the High Blue gold medal.

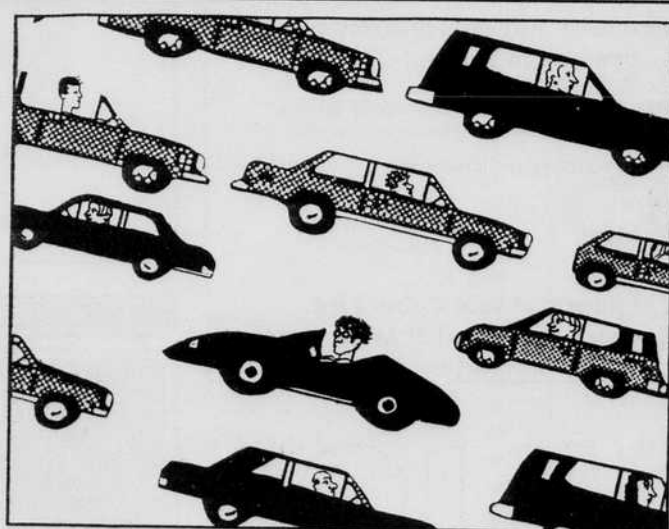
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
