Hatfield honored with doctorate

AWARD: Sen. Mark Hatfield will receive an honorary doctorate for his commitment to education

Sen. Mark Hatfield will receive the highest award the University can give when he is presented with the award of Honorary Doctorate in June.

"He's absolutely deserving of this honor; he's been a friend to students in the OSSHE system," said Andy Clark, associate director of government relations for the Oregon State System of Higher Education.

In February of 1996, the University Senate voted unanimously to award Hatfield with the honorary doctorate. But because the Senate's policy does not allow the award to be bestowed upon anyone who is currently a member of congress or the state government, the presentation of the award was delayed.

Last February, the OSSHE Board approved the Senate's request to award Hatfield with an honorary doctorate.

This award is given to someone who has extraordinary accomplishments, said Dave Hubin, executive assistant president.

"It's a rare event and a signal of extraordinary distinction," he said.

Helping the University obtain \$33.4 million in federal funding for the new science complex was one extraordinary accomplishment of Hatfield's.

"He was definitely the one who had the vision and foresight to help us build those facilities," said Pat Martin, assistant vice president for federal affairs. "The new facility enhanced our ability to attract outstanding faculty and students."

This project was just one way that Hatfield showed he valued higher education and the state's future, Martin said.

"One of his top priorities was to help the state in ways that furthered the future of the state," she said. "The projects that he's chosen to help have been beneficial all throughout the state."

Hatfield's high principles during his 30-year career in the U.S. Senate also helped him secure

the award, Hubin said.

"The award for Senator Hatfield is for the esteem he's held...the model he demonstrated of personal and political integrity."

Not only has Hatfield been instrumental in the funding of higher education, but he has been instrumental in the teaching of it as well. He taught political science and was the dean of students at Willamette University from 1950 to 1956. He will return to Willamette this fall to teach a political science class.

"Senator Hatfield is a fantastic educator, and education is always in his top priority," Martin said.

The award of Honorary Doctorate to Hatfield is only the second to be awarded in the last fifty years. Two years ago, Corazon Aquino, the former president of the Republic of the Philippines, received an honorary doctorate from the University.

Hatfield will receive the award of Honorary Doctorate at the University commencement ceremony on June 14, at which time he will also make the commencement speech.

Kickler chosen as new ODE editor

"I'll be happy to finally get a good night's sleep in the first two weeks since I've turned in the application," she said.

Kickler will begin training for the job as editor this term and will officially begin her term on June 10. She will succeed Steven Asbury.
