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room. Future patrons won't actually find the animals or plants in their rooms, but it wasn't always that way. When Drobac and her husband Martin first moved in, they couldn't figure out how starlings kept occupying a particular room.

After discovering a few holes left over from earlier occupants, the room was justly given the name Starling's Nest.

"We consigned [the starlings] to the eaves," Drobac said reassuringly. "They're not allowed to nest in here anymore."

Although the couple scoured the Washington, Oregon and California borders looking for the perfect place to house a bed and breakfast, Drobac said she fell in love with the Baker house from the moment she saw it. "I just thought we could do it...and I've never been sorry," Drobac said.

However, Drobac said the peeling paint, rusty plumbing and total lack of any yard, let alone a garden, gave her husband enormous reservations about the project. On more than one occasion, Drobac said her husband told her he was going to have her committed for taking on such an enormous renovation project.

Despite the lack of ghosts or legends to fall back on, the house has certainly had its share of visitors. On top of the family who has owned the *Register-Guard* since 1927, Drobac mentioned a University football coach who rented the house from the Baker family after they moved out. In addition,

Drobac said a lumber company is known to have used the building to house workers during a little rest and relaxation.

The Tau Kappa Epsilon fraternity frequented the halls at one time, not to mention the kitchen, where a fire occurred, Drobac said.

By the 1970s, the Delta Zeta sorority bought the building and added a middle wing and a large dining room. Throughout the '80s, the farmhouse was used as a women's dormitory.

The last occupant called it The Cottage, a branch of University housing that Drobac said hosted fifty-four women at one time.

Throughout the house's evolution, numerous additions and wings have been constructed. One of Drobac's new additions to the gameroom is a wall-sized painting entitled *Daphne*, a mythical goddess that took artist Lynn French five to six months to complete. Martin Drobac first saw the four-by-six inch painting and asked French if she could enlarge it to five-by-eight.

French took that to mean inches, but Martin Drobac meant feet. "It's 99 percent bigger than the original," French said. "It evolved incredibly."

Although the bed and breakfast is not scheduled for its grand opening for a few more weeks, the garden is apparently not a secret to prospective visitors to the University.

"We're already sold out for graduation," Drobac said. "We've been turning people away."

Greek System: Student said acts were not consensual

Kappa Sigma declined comment.

Corvallis police arrested Oregon State student Rene Frederic Haynes on charges of first degree rape and first degree sodomy on April 13, said Detective Brewer, the investigating officer.

An 18-year-old Oregon State student told police she had attended a party at the Delta Tau Delta fraternity house where she was served several cans of beer, Corvallis police said.

She told police that during the party she had apparently lost consciousness and awakened in a vehicle driven by Haynes, whom she did not know. She then lost consciousness again and awak-

ened in his residence where, according to police, Haynes was engaged in an act of sodomy with her.

She passed out again at this point and woke up to Haynes having sexual intercourse with her, Corvallis police said. The victim told police that none of the acts were consensual and she was unconscious at the time.

Haynes is a member of Chi Phi fraternity and was a guest at the party.

He is presently lodged at the Benton County Correctional facility. His hearing was at 1:10 p.m. Tuesday and his next court appearance is on April 22 where he will be arraigned.

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
