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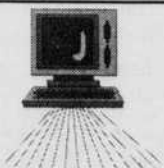
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Women: Davis helps Ducks with two wins

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season behind a 2:06.58 she recorded a month ago. The NCAA automatic qualifying mark is 2:05.

The Ducks got a lift from sprinter Sue Morris who took the 200 and 400-meter dash titles and anchored the winning 4x400-meter relay team.

"I knew I had the strength," Morris said of winning the 200 and 400.

Both Morris and Aisha Wallace set season bests in the 200 with times of 24.83 and 24.87, respectively.

"I actually was happy that we went 1-2 with Aisha. I think I was more happy for her than myself," Morris said.

With solid performances in the hammer, Oregon was able to beat Washington's Olympian Aretha Hill. Michelle Dick had three personal bests and a Pac-10 qualifying mark with a throw of 154-5 that was good for second-place.

Chris Cvitanich won the competition for the Ducks with a 157-2 mark.

Oregon's javelin corps swept the Huskies as Katie Pearmine won with a 155-2 mark, which is her best throw since the first outdoor meet of the season. Karis Howell was right behind Pearmine with a 154-9 throw. Tasha Cooper took third for the Ducks.

The 400-meter hurdles did not live up to its pre-meet expectations, as Washington Keisha Griffis was entered in the competition at the last minute after winning the 100-meter hurdles and placing second in the 100-meter dash.

Tish Henes easily won the race for Oregon with a 1:00.22.

"I think the wind foiled some better performances in the 800 and 400 hurdles," Heinonen said.

The Ducks will return to action next Saturday with the Oregon Twilight at Hayward Field.

Men: Dreissen takes first in intermediate hurdles

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Bleakney leaped 50-0 3/4, a season best as he continues to recover from a hamstring injury that forced him to miss the first part of the season.

"I felt like I could have gone a lot further," Bleakney said. "[The hamstring] felt a lot better today. It passed the test."

Jody Mortimore narrowly missed making it a sweep for the Ducks in the jumps. His long jump of 24-3 1/2 led the field until Ed Turner went 24-3 1/2 on his last attempt to take the victory.

It was in the running events where the Huskies won the meet, winning seven of the nine events and both relays.

Fresh off his victory in the long jump, Turner blew away the field in the 100- and 200-meter dashes for his second and third victories of the day.

"It's a fact that there isn't a true sprinter on our team and it hurt us in this meet," Dellinger said. "The

100 and 200 were the events that really killed us."

Washington's Brice Newton won the 800- and 1,500-meter runs for his two victories.

However, there were a few bright spots for the Ducks in running events.

Daniel Das Neves won the steeplechase in a time of 8 minutes, 53.71 seconds.

Will Dreissen was impressive with a win in the 400-meter hurdles in a time of 52.22, a personal best by nearly a second.

"I thought that Will Dreissen had a real breakthrough today," Dellinger said.

Nat Johnson cruised to personal bests in the 400-meter dash and 200 while finishing second and third.

"Nat Johnson shows that he's going to have a great three years ahead of him at Oregon because he's going to do nothing but get better," Dellinger said. "It's not too often we find someone that runs a 400 and then will come back and run the 200 for us."

Women's golf team earns NCAA bid

The Oregon women's golf team came back to finish a strong sixth at the NCAA Division I West Region Championship in Tucson, Ariz., Saturday.

The No. 12 Ducks shot a final-round 293 to move up from seventh to sixth on the last day, earning themselves an invitation to the NCAA Championship in Columbus, Ohio, May 21-24.

Paula Patterson's final round moved her up 12 places to put her in a tie for fifth overall. Patterson finished two shots behind the winner, Dodie Mazzuca of Washington, with a three-under-par 213 for the tournament.

Oregon's Pam Sowden tied for 32nd place shooting rounds of 75, 72 and 76 for a total of 223, finishing second for Oregon.

Karen Bristow and Kylie Wilson both tied for 42nd with 226. Bristow shot rounds of 78, 75 and 73, while Wilson carded rounds of 76, 74 and 76. Anika Heuser finished tied for 53 with a 228, including rounds of 75, 77 and 76.

Arizona State won the team title with an 865, one shot ahead of Arizona and five shots ahead of Stanford. New Mexico State was fourth with 883. San Jose State was fifth with 884 and Oregon was sixth with 885.

Women's tennis eliminated from NCAA's

San Diego State ended the Oregon women's tennis team's first-ever NCAA Tournament appearance with a 5-2 victory in first round of the West Regional Friday.

Oregon's Ali Napier and Shanelle Kaneshiro earned the Ducks' only victories at the No. 3 and 5 spots, respectively.

At the No. 1 singles position, Alina Wygonowska was the only other Duck to take her match to three sets.

Oregon ended its season at 7-11, and the Aztecs moved on to the second round of the West Regional.

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
