

# ASUO: Advisory group wants symposium to lead to UO course

tions need to be met in order to ensure that students have an active part in planning the direction of the symposium.

The number one condition the ASUO is requesting is that the committee planning the symposium have equal representation and voting rights for students on the committee.

"Do we want this to be another situation where we sit there, but what we want is ignored?" MEChA member Angelica Romero asked. Romero emphasized that in order for her or other students to sit on the committee, the students need to be able to dictate the content of the symposium.

The students also voiced concerns about

the reason Frohnmayer wants this conference and whether it will focus on the issues brought before him by the group Students Taking Action Now Demand (STAND).

"If this symposium is another way for Frohnmayer to get [positive] publicity and is just about capitalism then I don't want to sit on [the committee]," Romero said.

MEChA Co-Director Emily Lerma said the motivation she has heard from the administration for the conference so far is "shocking. They sit there and talk about how this will bring the University national prestige," she said.

The advisory group, Miner and ASUO Vice President-Elect Ben Unger said they want this symposium to lead to a regularly

taught course at the University, which was one of STAND's demands at the earlier meeting.

Unger said one way to get this and other goals achieved is to get the administration to make specific promises and "hold them accountable to what they promise." This is why the promise of a Spring 1998 labor issues class is part of the terms set for student participation in the conference.

The advising group said if Frohnmayer's symposium ignores the issues the students want it to address, then it is possible that the student groups will organize a counter symposium to run soon after the one Frohnmayer is proposing.

Miner emphasized that the symposium is

a good idea, but it is important not to forget the student activism and the reason it is being held, which is why the ASUO is submitting these conditions to Frohnmayer for participating in the symposium.

Along with issues surrounding the symposium, the group also discussed where the Gardenburger boycott is and how they can get it to move forward.

Romero said she would like to see Frohnmayer give MEChA specific consumption goals to achieve because the students are making a compromise in regard to the symposium.

"We are negotiating on the terms of the symposium so he needs to do the same," she said.

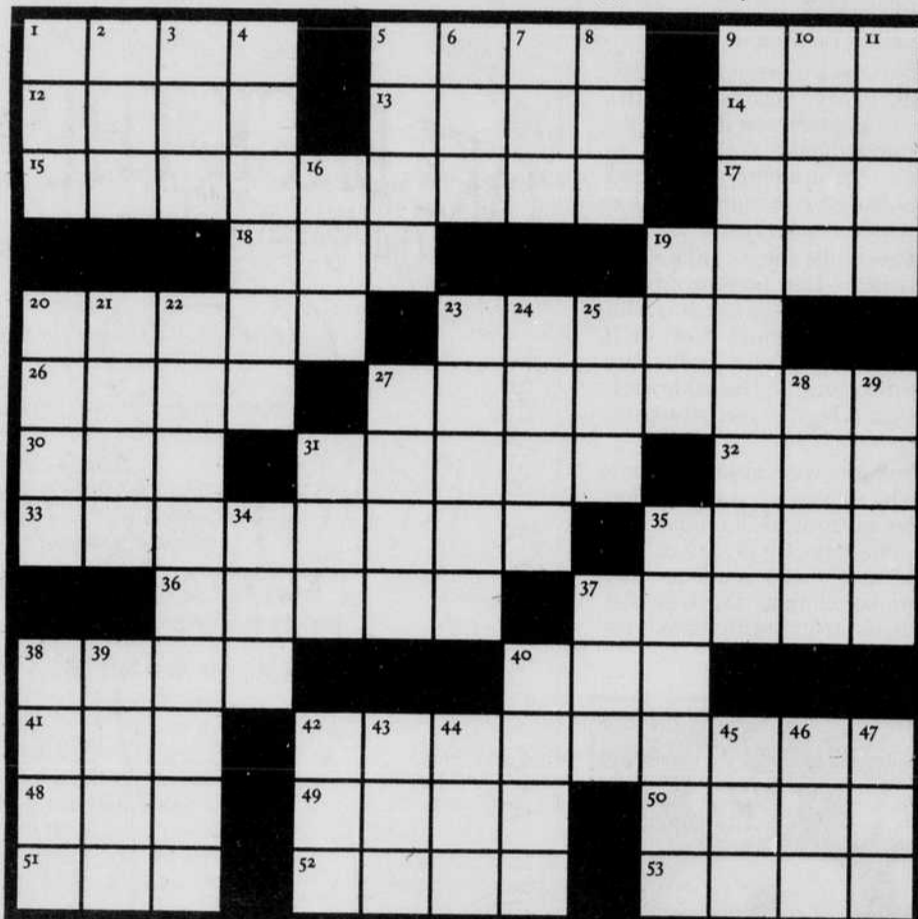
