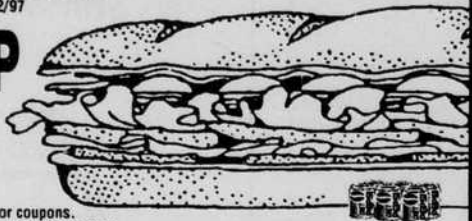


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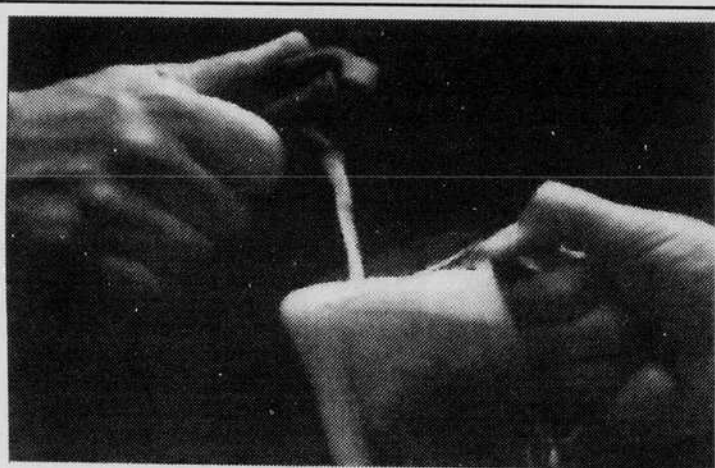

That's why, when you party, it's good to know what your limits are. You see, a little sobering thought now can save you from a big problem later.

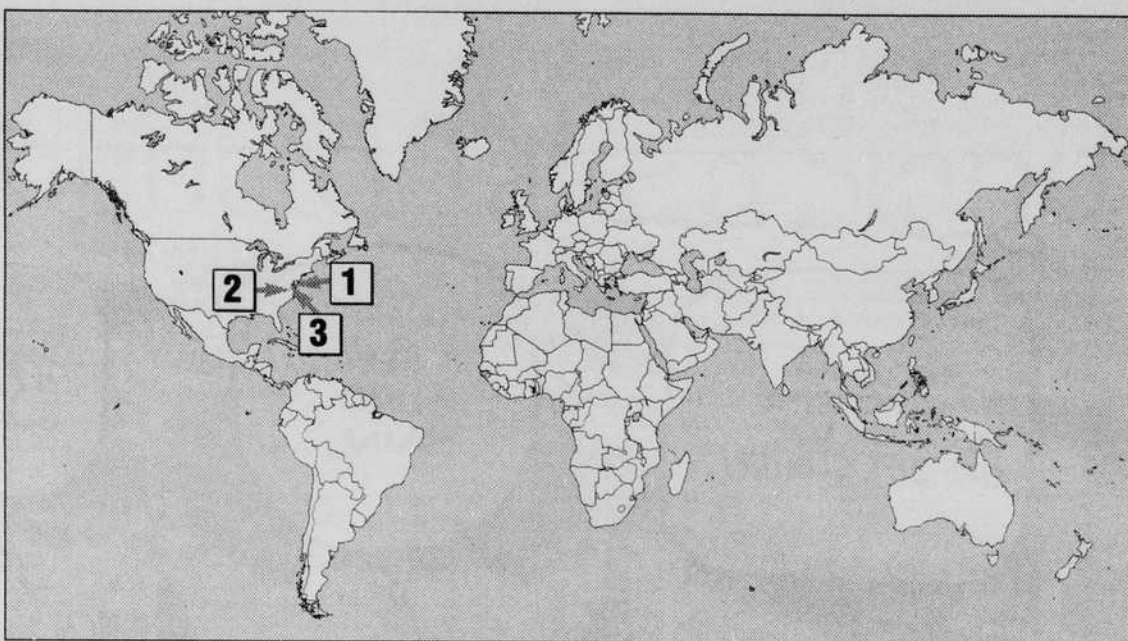

### Clinton seeks vaccine for AIDS in 10 years

**1** BALTIMORE — President Clinton invoked the legacy of John F. Kennedy's 1960s race to the moon Sunday and set a national target of developing an AIDS vaccine within the next 10 years.

"We dare not be complacent" in meeting the challenge of HIV, the AIDS virus, Clinton said in announcing creation of a research center at the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Md., to complete the task. Up to 50 researchers will staff the suburban Washington facility, drawn from existing NIH programs, and no new money was earmarked.

AIDS activists immediately attacked the plan as a warmed-over version of earlier failed policies.

"This is a phony announcement," said Wayne Turner, Washington spokesman for the AIDS activist group ACT-UP. "He talks the big talk, but all he's doing is reshuffling a couple dozen employees."

The president said the United States is entering an age of advances in biology and outlined an agenda for ensuring that scientific breakthroughs benefit all people.

"If the 21st century is to be the century of biology, let us make an AIDS vaccine its first great triumph," Clinton told 850 graduates of Morgan State University.

### 20 injured, 1 killed at commencement in Va.

**2** CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. — A second-floor balcony filled with people seeking a good view of the University of Virginia's graduation ceremonies collapsed Sunday, killing one person and injuring about 20.

The balcony of the columned, red-brick building designed by Thomas Jefferson gave way 15 minutes before the commencement got under way at 10 a.m. on the university's central lawn.

Those on the balcony fell about 15 feet onto a brick walkway. Many of the injured had been standing beneath the balcony, said Leonard Sandridge, a university vice president.

Twenty people were treated at the University of Virginia Medical Center. One person died during emergency surgery. A second person who was in critical condition also required surgery. The identities of the victims and the nature of the injuries were not immediately available.

There were about 40 people on a section of the balcony when the floor began slipping away from an iron support rod anchored into the roof overhead, witnesses said. It took about a minute for the 15-by-10-foot section to collapse, and most people had clambered off of it by then.

"You could see the floor rippling and waving as it was falling," said Debbie Mahone, 45, of Richmond, who was on the balcony to watch a family friend graduate.

### Cosby tells graduates to get out of debt

**3** WASHINGTON — Bill Cosby told George Washington University's graduating class on Sunday that finishing college is just the beginning.

"There's a huge track behind you, but once tomorrow comes you still got those credit cards, you still got phone bills, you still got car bills, you still got so many things to deal with," he said.

Wearing neon yellow-brimmed sunglasses and a GW baseball cap with a gold tassel, the TV star strutted down the aisle at the National Mall ceremony alongside the university's academics. He turned his cap backwards in response to the cheering and whistling crowd.

Cosby was as jovial as the graduates while accepting an honorary doctor of humanities. He received a standing ovation from the 3,200 graduates before giving them some advice.

"If you really want to make it in the world, you don't have to be huge and powerful," he said. "All you have to do is pay off your student loans. Get out of debt."

He warned the graduates of what they are to expect for their immediate futures: "Tomorrow, no more free lunches, no more free rides. Just a lot of questions. Do you have a job yet?"

As he prepared to leave the stage, Cosby removed his gown to reveal a sweatshirt with the words "Hello Friends" on it.

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
