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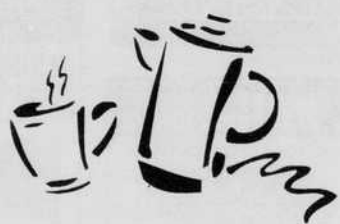

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NBA PLAYOFFS

Stockton lifts Utah into finals

HOUSTON — The Utah Jazz are in the NBA Finals for the first time in their history, thanks to a buzzer-beating 3-point shot and a fantastic fourth quarter by John Stockton.

Stockton swished the wide-open, game-winner from 25 feet away as the clock was expiring to give Utah a dramatic 103-100 victory in Game 6 of the Western Conference finals.

"I'm just glad it went in. I'm so excited," Stockton said.

"When it left his hand it looked like it was good," said forward Karl Malone. "I didn't know how to react. I thought it was good when it left. ... I'm so proud of these guys. We said we wanted to win it here. It makes it that much sweeter because they've knocked us out a couple of times."

The basket capped Utah's comeback from a seven-point deficit in the final two minutes and put the Jazz into the championship round against the Chicago Bulls.

Coach Jerry Sloan, a former Bulls player and coach, admitted he hadn't given much thought to

playing against his former team.

"I never thought we'd ever get there," he said. "It's been a long road to get back to that situation."

This was Utah's fourth trip to the conference finals in six years, and the Jazz had earned a reputation as a team that couldn't win the big game.

Stockton put an end to that history by taking over the game in the final quarter — especially the final two minutes. He finished with 25 points and 13 assists in his best game of the series, with 15 of his points coming in the final 12 minutes.

Houston took a 98-91 lead with 2:02 left on two foul shots by Charles Barkley, but Bryon Russell answered with his third 3-pointer of the night to pull Utah within four.

Stockton drove the lane for an almost uncontested layup with 1:22 left, then recovered a loose ball in the lane after Clyde Drexler lost control. Stockton took it all the way in for a layup that tied the game at 98-all with 1:03 left.

Barkley made two more free throws with 32 seconds remaining, and the Jazz called an isola-

tion play for Stockton. Dribbling 1-on-1 against veteran Sedale Threatt, he went right past him and scored on a leaner in the lane to tie the game with 22.4 left.

That allowed Houston to set up for the last shot, and the Rockets ran a clear-out for Drexler, who was having his best game since mid-January. Drexler dribbled the clock inside five seconds, made a spin move and missed an off-balance runner from 12 feet.

Malone rebounded and the Jazz called timeout and set up the final play with just over two seconds left. Russell inbounded to Stockton, who found himself wide open as Malone screened Mario Elie — Stockton's defender — away from the play.

Stockton calmly took a step forward, cocked the ball above his right shoulder in his usual manner and let fly a 3-pointer that was all net.

He threw his arms in the air, danced in a circle to midcourt and jumped up and down as his teammates mobbed him in a joyous celebration that shocked the sellout crowd in The Summit.

Pippen's mind clear on foot injury

CHICAGO — Michael Jordan still has three great years left, coach Phil Jackson wants to return, and the Chicago Bulls will keep winning NBA titles if their nucleus stays together.

So says Scottie Pippen, whose immediate future is slightly less murky than his team's long-range outlook.

Pippen has what the team is calling a "soft tissue injury to the bottom of his left foot." The Bulls said Thursday that X-rays and an MRI revealed no fractures or ligament damage and listed the All-Star forward's status as day-to-day heading into the NBA Finals.

"I'm not concerned," Pippen said Thursday. "If I put forth a lot of effort treating myself, I should be fine."

Pippen had to leave Wednesday's Eastern Confer-

ence clincher in the first quarter, but the Bulls still defeated the Miami Heat 100-87 to earn a shot at their fifth title in seven years.

The Bulls were to learn Thursday night if they would meet Utah in the finals beginning Sunday or if the title series wouldn't start until June 4 against Utah or Houston.

"The soft tissue is a little tender. I'm tiptoeing around," Pippen said. "But at this stage of the season, you have to see just how much pain you can tolerate. Hopefully, I can shake it in a couple of days."

Even before the injury, Pippen had plenty on his mind.

He, like everyone else associated with the Bulls, wonders if the team will be kept intact.

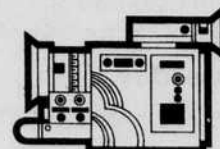
"I'm just keeping my fingers crossed," he said. Pippen has a year left on his contract and could be traded if the Bulls don't resign Jordan and Jackson, each finishing a one-year deal. Dennis Rodman also is unsigned beyond this season.



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
